

U. S. Offers Britain Use Of 11 Liberty Ships To Erase Bill On "Queens"

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24 (AP)—The United States has offered Britain the use of 11 Liberty ships as a substitute for the arrangement under which American troops are ferried home aboard the Queen Mary at a tentative charge of \$100 each. Government officials said the offer has not yet been accepted. Presumably, the British are weighing the need for troop carriers for their own Tommies and Colonials against that of reaching a settlement which would supplement their dollar credit in this country.

September 2, the Queen Mary has brought home 84,804 American troops. The Queen Elizabeth, before being withdrawn from the U. S. run, carried another 29,302.

Total Charge
Together—unless the present charge is reduced or the American offer of the Liberty ships is accepted—the total charge to this country would be \$11,419,600 as of now.

While lend-lease still was in effect, the British bore the cost of transporting GI's aboard the two "Queens" as part of reverse lend-lease.

Technically, a fee of 25 pounds, or roughly \$100, was assessed against this government for each man. This, however, was wiped out at the time of the final lend-lease settlement and did not involve any cash changing hands.

When lend-lease ended, the same charge was retained. But government officials said today this, too, is subject to revision when the job of bringing the troops home has been completed.

C Of C Sets Up Statement Of Principles Of Principles

Rolling of the membership of the chamber of commerce on a proposed statement of principles relating to the present national emergency was approved by the directors of the organization at their noon luncheon Tuesday.

The national affairs committee and the chamber executive committee, in suggesting the statement, said it had been planned with the purpose of establishing broad principles upon which reasonable, unprejudiced people could agree, regardless of walk in life.

The statement will be drafted into final form, and submitted to the membership for approval or disapproval. Each declaration will be set out for separate expressions of sentiment. The chamber program developed out of suggestions from the Klamath Automobile Dealers association.

The chamber received a letter from Congressman Lowell Stockman stating that the veterans administration had definitely decided to build a hospital at Klamath Falls and that the decision "means Klamath Falls."

The comment was made in reference to reports from Medford that the Klamath site decision means "Klamath Falls vicinity" which the Medford report claimed might include Medford. Stockman said the policy of the vets administration is to build its hospitals within three miles of the city designated.

The congressman indicated that Medford's Camp White hospital is under consideration, but whatever decision is made on that will not affect the Klamath institution.

NANAIMO, B. C., Jan. 24 (AP)—This city was digging its way back to normal today after the worst snowstorm in more than 10 years cut off communications temporarily with outside points and seriously hampered transportation within the city.

All bus service was cut off for a time and telephone and telegraph service was cut off for a few hours. Steamship service to Vancouver was cancelled overnight.

Operation Successful In Rare Case Of 'Blue' Baby

BALTIMORE, Jan. 24 (AP)—The day none of them "thought would ever come," has arrived for the Hackman family—Mr. and Mrs. Henry Hackman and 2-year-old Judy of Buckley, Wash.

Judy, threatened with an early death a few short months ago, no longer is a "blue" baby.

She was discharged from Johns Hopkins hospital yesterday and is on her way home with her mother and father.

Although her convalescence will be long and slow, hospital officials said her delicate operation was "everything we expected. Judy is no longer cyanotic (blue)."

Said Mrs. Hackman: "This is the day I thought would never come. And now it's here."

Judy was brought to Johns Hopkins December 3, suffering with malformed heart, on her lips the deadly blue tinge.

The skill of Drs. Alfred Blacklock and Helen B. Taussig combined in a delicate operation December 8, by sewing a good artery to a defective one they augmented her deficient supply of oxygenated blood.

Today a healthy pink replaced the blue in Judy's lips.

Doctors say the plane trip home will be no hazard, although oxygen tanks will be carried
