

# Stark Reports On Plans Aimed At Bringing More Tourists To This Area

Following his return late this morning from a two week's business trip throughout the northwest, Charles Stark, member of the Klamath County chamber of commerce, reported today on the northwest's postwar plans aimed at bringing greater tourist trade and all round development to this region.

At the Pacific Northwest Tourist association conference in Butte, Mont., on January 14 and 15, an outline of the 1946 program was presented. One of the main features is the project of bringing travel editors from the newspapers of large cities in other sections of the country to this area to tour points of interest with the expense of the trips paid, in the hope of bringing greater attention to the northwest from the angle of tourist trade.

Another plan is to participate in travel shows in the east, where booths of pictures, folders, and pamphlets of the region are displayed. This project was abandoned during the war, but will soon be resumed, Stark said.

The other big conference Stark attended was in Boise, Idaho, at a meeting of the Northwest Planning council on January 21 and 22.

## Dance To Aid Polio Drive

Those who attend or support the March of Dimes dance at the Klamath Army on Saturday evening, January 26, are giving their pledge to the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, founded in 1938 by the late Franklin D. Roosevelt, that no victim of polio shall go without care and treatment for lack of money, regardless of age, race, creed or color.

The foundation which leads, directs and unifies the fight against infantile paralysis and is dedicated to the conquest of this disease, is supported by the annual March of Dimes and has chapters in nearly all of the 3070 counties in the United States.

Of those attacked by polio, 50 per cent recover completely, 29 per cent are left with slight residual handicap, 18 per cent remain paralyzed and 3 per cent die.

## The World Today

MADRID, Jan. 25—There are several conclusions which I have reached regarding Chief

is on the right road for the good of Spain. (Indeed I've heard it said that he feels he was predestined to lead the nation). He is a man of granite convictions from which it is difficult to move him.

Now those are points which we must understand in order to arrive at a correct appraisal of El Caudillo's actions. Of course, the United States and other countries have taken bitter exception to many of the policies he has pursued. There was the Potsdam declaration which decreed that the Franco regime rendered Spain unsuitable to participate in the United Nations organization. And I had the temerity to tell him during our interview:

"The people of the United States have fought a great war against nazism and fascism. Thousands of our boys have died for this cause. Rightly or wrongly the American public feels that Spain was in effect an ally of Germany and Italy, and finds it hard to forgive that."

As I reported in yesterday's

column, the generalissimo declared categorically that he neither subscribed to nor supported nazi and fascist policies or political views. Well, naturally, that leaves a lot unanswered, but I have a strong feeling that he is very desirous of reestablishing good relations with the United States and Britain.

How that desire shall be treated isn't my pigeon but that of Washington and London. I'm merely trying to do an objective job of reporting and interpretation in the hope that it may be useful. The very fact that many governments object to the Franco regime makes it imperative that his viewpoint be known abroad.

There is small doubt, as I see it, that Spain is orienting its policy toward the United States and England. I told Generalissimo Franco the impression prevailed abroad that this was so, and asked for his comment. His reply, while couched in cautious terms which might be described as indirect lighting, would seem to confirm that idea. This is the way he put it:

"Neither during the Spanish national movement (civil war of 1936-39) nor after it did the Spanish government cease taking care of its relations with the United States and Great Britain, and even in those moments of the war when the passions and errors of others could have made those relations suffer, Spain sought to avoid those damages with its serenity and good faith."

"You will understand that the



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situation of Spain was not easy. It had to defend its independence, which was threatened by the needs of the belligerents, and conserve at the same time the peace and friendship of all nations.

Numerous Bonds

"Because of our civilizing work in America, and the numerous bonds which unite us, Spain considers itself a spiritual part of the American continent and feels attraction and admiration for the great accomplishments of North America, aspiring to a greater interchange in all respects. In view of this, as many Spaniards as possible are putting themselves into contact with the North American people and whenever North Americans visit us there is mutual understanding and esteem."

"With England we have had a century and a half of peace and good relations, and the interchanges of all kinds between our peoples are traditional. "Before the war we esteemed the peace and comprehension that was to be found among the peoples of the west; today we accept the lessons of the war and we consider them (peace and comprehension) still more necessary. North America, Great Britain and Spain are peoples who live on the shore of the same sea. For that rea-
