Equipment Set Up To Study Crater Lake

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 25 (AP)—The hazardous task of installing sound equipment in snowbound Crater lake to listen for possible volcanic activity was partially completed today.

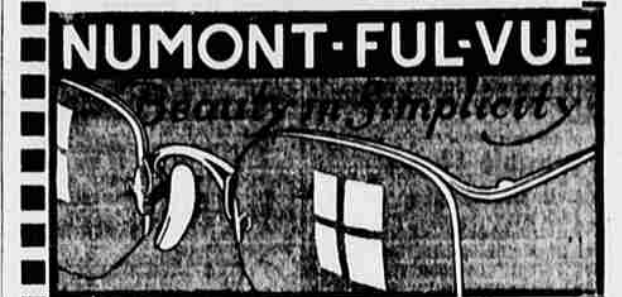
Chief Ranger J. Carlisle Crouch radioed to the park superintendent that four men had lowered sound measuring instruments and cable down the treacherous 100-foot slope from the crater's rim to the lake edge.

A. U. S. Geologist, F. W. Cater, installed for the winter at the crater's rim, will listen for another of the giant "burps" which have sent clouds of smoke from

the lake and which geologists think may indicate recurring volcanic activity. The workmen will now build a raft, from which the sound measuring apparatus will be anchored 10 feet below the ancient lake's surface. Sounds will be heard on a drum recorder installed in Cater's solitary headquarters at Crater lake lodge.
