

Deer Herd Situation In Modoc County Discussed By Wild Life Officials

ALTURAS—A meeting of wild life technicians and sportsmen was held in the local forest service office to study and discuss the deer situation in Modoc county.

The purpose of the meeting, initiated by Gordon True of the California state game and fish division, was to study the condition of the interstate deer herd and the ways and means of perpetuating the herd in the best interests of game management and range utilization.

Representatives at the meeting included Gordon True, W. B. Williams and Jim Stokes of the California state game and fish commission; John McKee of the Oregon fish and game commission; Phil Lord, region 3; Glenn Mitchell, region 6; H. K. Pyles and George Fisher, all of the forest service; Frank McCormack representing the Oregon sportsmen; Nelmer Spaulding who was to have represented the California sportsmen, was unable to attend the meeting.

Census Methods

High lights of the meeting were discussion and proposals of the present census methods now being carried on by Ranger George Fisher, this year with the cooperation of Jim Stokes of the fish and game commission.

It was proposed that all agencies accept the present methods to indicate trends and classification and to supplement the present "strip" methods by pellet counts, aerial photographs and track counts. These methods are not already in use and will insure more accuracy.

It was further proposed that at the close of each season, representatives of each agency would prepare a joint report covering the condition of the herd, its members and classification by sex and age groups.

Forage utilization by both deer and live stock was thoroughly discussed.

As a result, it was proposed that the present utilization sample plots be extended to a satisfactory number to indicate a true picture of the forage used by deer and that used by other livestock. It was proposed to install large fence plots within

the winter deer range which would:

1. Exclude use of all deer and livestock.
2. Exclude livestock only.
3. Enclose deer only.
4. Enclose livestock only.

Cooperation

All agencies would cooperate in this project. The California state fish and game commission will take a large share of the financial burden of these plots established in California. From these plots it is expected to determine the actual amount of competition between domestic livestock and deer and, in addition, the quantity of forage necessary to support both deer and livestock. Also the quantity of forage necessary during the critical winter period to support the winter deer herd.

The forage utilization by wild horses was determined to have reached serious proportions. It was estimated that the wild horse herd had increased steadily in the last few years and had now reached a size where a critical expansion may be expected unless some action is taken to cut down the present size of the herd. Mr. True promised to furnish considerable assistance in removing the wild horses from the range. It was estimated last year that there were 400 horses of which 50 per cent are in the winter range area of the state deer herd.

The meeting closed with the general feeling that a common understanding of the deer problem was being achieved by all agencies involved.
