

# Lie Named Candidate To UNO Post

LONDON, Jan. 29 (AP)—Trygve Lie, a carpenter's son who became Norway's foreign minister, tonight was nominated secretary-general of the United Nations.

The stocky 50-year-old lawyer-diplomat was selected as a compromise candidate for a \$20,000-a-year post after a session of the five principal power representatives in the hotel room of U. S. Delegate Edward R. Stettinius Jr. last night.

Previously the Americans had backed Lester Pearson, Canadian ambassador in Washington, while Russia had been supporting Lie.

In the tense dispute between Russia and Iran, representatives of the two countries were expected to meet today to seek a solution of that controversy.

Obstacles to the agreement on a secretary-general mostly were worked out at a five-power meeting last night in the hotel room of U. S. Delegate Stettinius Jr., chief U. S. delegate.

Authoritative information said that the United States suddenly gave up its advocacy of Lester Pearson, Canadian ambassador to Washington, and Stettinius formally proposed Lie as a compromise who might be acceptable to the United States, Britain and Russia.

**Candidate**  
The 50-year-old Norwegian lawyer-diplomat was Moscow's candidate for president of the UNO, but lost to Paul-Henri Spak, foreign minister of Belgium in later balloting.

A United States proposal to set up an 11-member committee to seek further contributions to UNRRA from United Nations members was adopted unanimously by the assembly's social and humanitarian committee after a table-pounding speech by Rep. Sol Bloom (D-N.Y.). Bloom won over the votes of several Latin American countries which previously had announced they were not able to promise any further financial help to UNRRA.

Iran's new premier, Ahmed Qavam es Saffaneh, disclosed in Tehran that he had instructed Ali Sobhly, Iranian UNO delegate, to confer with Soviet Vice Foreign Minister Andrei Vishinsky in a new effort to settle the dispute by direct talks.

United Nations sources said they had high hopes that the conference would "ease the tension."

# Snowfalls Make State Roads Worse

SALEM, Jan. 29 (AP)—Highway conditions in Oregon were worse today after heavy snowfalls at higher elevations and in parts of eastern Oregon, the state highway commission said.

Travel on the state's two major routes was slowed by ice on the Old Oregon Trail east of Pendleton, and by ice on the Pacific highway in the Siskiyou mountains as well as at Medford and Grants Pass.

The daily road report: Government Camp — Snowing, 9 inches new snow, 78 inches total snow, temperature 22 degrees.

Santiam junction — Snowing lightly, 26 degrees, 12 inches new snow, total snow at summit 119 inches, at junction 70 inches.

Odele lake — Snowing hard, 17 degrees, 11 inches new snow, total snow 129 inches. Chains required. One-way traffic between Oakridge and summit.

Siskiyou summit — Ice condition in Siskiyou south of Ashland also at Medford and Grants Pass.

**New Snow**  
Klamath Falls — Four inches new snow on Hayden mountain on Green Springs highway, still snowing. Three inches new snow on Quartz mountain on Lakeview highway, still snowing. Two inches new snow on Sun mountain on The Dalles-California highway, still snowing. Total snow 102 inches.

Roseburg — Snow and rain. Astoria — Rain and sleet. Light snow in mountain areas. Short detour on Columbia highway at east city limits of Astoria. One-way traffic on Coast highway at Manzanita.

Coquille — Light snow at higher elevations, being sanded. The Dalles — Roads normal. Pendleton — Overcast, pavement dry.

Meacham — Snowing hard, 10 inches new snow, total 38 inches. Some packed snow on Oregon Trail between La Grande and Pendleton.

La Grande — Snowing. Half inch of new snow, packed snow on Old Oregon Trail.

# The World Today

MADRID, Jan. 29 — Freedom of the press naturally is an ideal which never ceases to flame within the newspaperman, and your correspondent would have been indeed a poor representative of his kind if he hadn't raised this question in his interview with the generalissimo Franco.

The subject is especially close to me because during the generation of my foreign service I've worked under censorship—some of them terribly harsh—in many countries of both hemispheres. More to the point, world peace depends on real acquaintance among the peoples of all nations. This acquaintance calls for the free exchange of news—not only reports of great events but the story of every day life. I asked the generalissimo if he shared this point of view.

**Free News Exchange**  
"Only in part," he replied, "for although a better acquaintance among peoples will contribute without doubt to peace among the nations, the free exchange of news will only favor it if the news is true and is the result of a faithful and objective judgment. If, on the contrary, the news sins by falsity and calumny then its effects would be totally adverse and would contribute to encourage differences among nations."

"This is a problem of morality and education, as it is among individuals. Good morality and painstaking education with other living together easy, but when these do not exist or are forgotten, living together is impossible. If it is really desired to take the road toward peace, it is necessary to return to the forms of good morality and courtesy damaged by the war."

**Ideas Cultivated**  
Franco said the government is seeking to cultivate these ideas through the Spanish press and he continued:

"The Spanish government at the end of the war decreed freedom of information for foreign correspondents. Spain desires not to conceal its truth from the world, and during the last 10 years it has been devoting its attention to preventing the irritation of its relations with other countries by excesses of its press or its radio, and has required from its organs of opinion a moderation which does not deprive them of the noble defense of that which affects us or of the serene and dispassionate criticism of great international events."
