Writes From China—In a letter received today by 'The Herald and News,' a Klamath man, F. L. Floyd E. Case, writes of meeting others from his home town. Young Case said he had been all over the South and North Pacific in the last 15 months without seeing a person from home. When his ship put in at Leyte, he met Jack Haney and they had "a swell time talking about old times at KUHS." Haney went aboard for transportation to Shanghai where Case is now stationed. By chance Case ran into Paul Nichols and Hubert Vanderhoff and the four men were together for a time. Case left Shanghai January 25 for Balboa, Panama, and said he expected to be home some time in April.
