

Vets Apply For Work On Farms

With veterans applying at the rate of eight and 10 per day at the farm labor office for agricultural work, C. A. Henderson, county agent, composed a letter to farmers in the county requesting their aid.

"The request for workers on farms and ranches is naturally far below the number of requests from workers at this time of year," Henderson pointed out. In this letter he asked the cooperation of farm owners in finding some work for veterans during this slack season.

"It seems," Henderson suggested, "that if everyone made a special effort to use an extra man for maintenance of equipment and other winter work, quite a number of these veterans could be absorbed until regular farm work opens up." This plan of using men during the slack season would be advantageous to the farmer also, as he would have someone whose efficiency could be depended upon when spring cultivating and planting require additional help.

Experienced
An unusual number of veterans registered at the farm labor office have had practical farm experience so that the farmer would not be contending with entirely "green" help. This type of work is particularly suited to veterans during their transition period from the strains of war to normal civilian lives.

The time before the rush of outdoor work starts, could be well employed in mending farm equipment, preparing insecticides and planning the year's work, Henderson suggested, and an extra man might very well be used.

About 1400 copies of the letter proposing use of veterans were mailed to farmers in Klamath county from the agent's office.

119 Million Bushels Of Spuds Stored

According to the latest check by the U. S. department of agriculture, there are over 119,000,000 bushels of Irish potatoes in cold storage, an increase of 15 per cent above last year's holdings. However, some markets may not be well supplied because growers and distributors are having difficulty obtaining sufficient refrigerator cars to move their storage holdings.

It is hoped that a good part of these stocks can be moved before the new crop of potatoes comes on in volume. Texas and Florida are already shipping their early varieties, and the supply will be increasing as the weeks go by.

It looks now as though the new crop will be very plentiful. Indications from the farm front point to an acreage of early crop potatoes 13 per cent larger than that recommended by the USDA. The greatest gain in plantings will be in the high yield areas of the country, so by April there may possibly be a potato surplus.

Conservation Needs Survey Will Be Held

County and community AAA committeemen met Tuesday afternoon with leading farmers and representatives of other farm agencies to discuss an overall conservation needs survey of the county, which is to begin immediately. AAA community committeemen will meet with representative farmers of their respective communities to make estimates of local needs. These estimates will be summarized by the county committee and submitted to the state office in the original together with a summary and county estimate. Every county and state in the union will submit such estimates to the national office.

All matters pertaining to the development and maintenance of Klamath county's agricultural resources will be covered in the survey. Among other things it will show total needs for leveling crop land, for irrigation changes and developments, for drainage, acreage of green manure and amount of fertilizers necessary to maintain and rebuild our soil resources, need for stock-water developments and other range improvements to provide full use of range feed for livestock.

The amount of such work which will be accomplished by the districts, individual farmers or without any outside help will also be estimated. The report
