

Man Shot In Attempted Get-Away

WALLACE, Idaho, Feb. 1 (AP)—A 21-year-old man who confessed that he stabbed to death John C. Farris, 64, Wallace night policeman, when the officer found him breaking into a grocery store, was shot four times as he tried to drive through a police road block in a stolen truck last night.

Police Chief Frank Hunt of Kellogg said the man was shot through the thighs four times when he failed to stop for a blockade at Kellogg at 8:40 p. m., just an hour and ten minutes after the body of Farris was found in nearby Wallace. The man is in good condition, Hunt said.

The chief said the man told officers he was attempting to rob a grocery store when Farris stopped there to inspect the place. The man said he grabbed Farris' gun, struck him over the head with it and then stabbed him, Hunt said. He added that the policeman's gun was found on the suspect.

Eleven Wounds

Eleven knife wounds were found on the dead policeman's body, one through the heart, Shoshone County Coroner Dr. H. Mowery reported.

Chief Hunt said the apprehended man told him he had left Montana 10 days ago while on parole from the state penitentiary at Deer Lodge where he had served two years of a ten-year sentence on larceny charges.

Wallace Chief of Police Charles Foust said Farris probably was slain between 7 and 7:15 p. m., about one and one-half hours before the suspect was captured. A coroner's report said the dead officer probably had been stabbed with a long knife, possibly a hunting knife.

Homma Weeps At War Crimes Trial

MANILA, Feb. 1 (AP)—Lt. Gen. Masaharu Homma cried today at his war crimes trial as character witnesses testified that he was kindhearted and that Filipinos "were very sorry when he left."

Tears welled to the eyes of the immaculately-dressed former Philippines commander when Hideo Kon told the U. S. military tribunal of Homma's "kindheartedness toward the Filipino people."

Kon, civilian formerly attached to the Japanese army information section, said Homma was removed because of opposition by militarists to his administration of the Philippines "along cultural lines."

bent on the jury to decide the truth of these contentions:

1. That the alleged act occurred in Klamath county.
2. That the alleged act occurred during a three-year period previous to the return of the indictment.
3. That the defendant committed the act in the manner stated in the indictment.

Judge Walker also mentioned that under Oregon law evidence of force or compulsion was not necessary in determining guilt and also instructed the jury as to accepting evidence given by an accomplice.

Jury Retires

The jury retired at 3:10 p. m. yesterday.

Earl Bernard, defense counsel, took exceptions to the judge's instructions that the date of commission of the act was not material, that the question of whether Virginia Rose Gibson was an accomplice in committing the act was submitted to the jury to decide, failure to instruct the jury that Miss Gibson was an accomplice, and the instruction of the jury to decide whether Virginia Gibson and the defendant were of "common intent" in participating in the alleged act of sodomy.

About 10 p. m. the jury asked for a dictionary to look up the meaning of the word "accomplice." Walker denied the request.

At 9:30 this morning the jury filed back into the box and four members asked the judge questions concerning his instructions about the testimony of an accomplice, the evidence of flight, and corroboration.

He repeated these portions of the instructions and the jurymen returned to their deliberations.

GI Brides From Britain Seasick

ABOARD THE S. S. ARGENTINA, Feb. 1 (AP)—The S. S. Argentina, bearing GI brides from Britain, ran into another storm of almost gale proportions today and the captain expressed the belief she would not reach New York before Sunday night or Monday morning.

The ship was approximately 1000 miles out in the Atlantic from New York.

The rough weather brought a recurrence of seasickness and some mental discomfort among the brides, but the ship's doctor said the great majority of them, including those pregnant, were "remarkably well."

Pastor Awaits Trial For Murder

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., Feb. 1 (AP)—The Rev. Frank W. Siple, pastor of a suburban church, today awaited circuit court trial on a murder charge in a seven-year-old slaying—the poisoning of his 18-year-old daughter Dorothy Ann.

The 53-year-old pastor was arraigned yesterday in both justice and circuit courts, and pleaded guilty to the slaying on both appearances. Circuit Judge Leonard D. Verdier directed a sanity commission examination for the defendant before remanding him to jail.

Profit On Smelt Said Too Small

ASTORIA, Feb. 1 (AP)—With the smelt run at its peak in the Cowlitz river, the Columbia River Packers association here announced it would not buy the fish at present.

The association claimed a reduction of the ceiling at which processors can sell frozen smelt — from 2 1/2 to 20 cents a pound — made the profit too small.

A-Bomb Destruction Of Ships Opposed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—Senator Lucas (D-Ill.) told the senate yesterday the navy should keep for possible future use the 96 warships it plans to expose to the atomic bomb.

But Senator Johnson (D-Colo.) commented to a reporter that he favors the experiment in order to "find out how obsolete our navy is."

"If we are to outlaw the use of atomic energy for war purposes," Lucas asked, "why should we have such a display of destruction now?"

Lucas said he wondered what would happen if the atomic bomb proved "a fizzle" in the tests.
