Fred Fleet Heads Social Hygiene Day

Plans for the Klamath county region, Social Hygiene Day are being carried out with the appointment of Fred E. Fleet of Klamath Falls, as chairman of the committee, with the support of city and county governments, civic and service clubs, churches and schools, PTA's and youth service organizations.

This year is a critical one with millions of men and women attempting to readjust from their years in the armed services and war industries, and that only a well-informed and concerned public can keep venereal diseases from claiming alarming numbers of victims during reconversion.

Mayor Ed Ostendorf said, "We have seen during the past five years how a community can handle problems concerning housing, youth activities, entertainment of the service men and women, and other phases of wartime living." "A community needs only to be made aware of a problem and it will act. One of the objectives of this year's Social Hygiene Day is to see to it that men and women know the important facts about the causes, developments, cures and means of prevention of the venereal diseases. We feel that the citizens of Klamath county region will realize the dangers of the postwar threat to health and homes and the necessity for working even harder than they did in wartime to stamp out VD.

Typing Class Will Be Held

Equipment To Be Taken From Crater Lake

Latest word from Crater Lake national park states that equipment for recording sound effects in the lake is being removed.
