MAIMED ATHLETE IS HONORED

PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 1 (AP)—A soft-spoken young man named Merrill Frost—scarred and maimed in a plane crash—was awarded the honor of "most courageous athlete of 1945" by the Philadelphia Sports Writers association.

The 24-year-old ex-GI—Dartmouth college football star—stood silently in the spotlight before the 1200 gathered at the association's 42nd annual banquet last night and said with a quiet eloquence:

"I've never had the opportunity to say this publicly, but I want to say it now. You've often heard the saying: 'Behind every great man there is a woman.' Now, I don't pretend to be great, but there was a woman—my wife." (She is the former Pauline McKenzie of Beverly, Mass.) Frost was burned seriously in the crash of an army bomber in Italy in 1943. He spent 18 months in hospitals. He was given 15 pints of blood plasma. He had six operations. Ears, eyebrows and skin were grafted to replace what he had lost.

Byron Nelson, the nation's number one golfer, was given in absentia the Sports Writers' award of the outstanding athlete of the year.

The banquet had a "victory" theme and Hank Greenberg addressed to it.

"Don't expect every returned veteran to be as good as he was before the war," the Detroit slugger said. "They were in a war," he added smiling, "they'll be in a different kind of war next season."

70 Grand Purse Lures Big Field

ARCADIA, Calif., Feb. 1 (AP)—Lured by a gross purse of \$70,000, a field of 16 to 18 Californian-bred three-year-olds and up loomed today as starters in tomorrow's mile and one-sixteenth Santa Catalina handicap at Santa Anita park.

Dick Metz Sets Pace At Tucson

TUCSON, Ariz., Feb. 1 (AP)—Paced by Dick Metz of Arkansas City, Kans., 94 professional and amateur golfers teed off today in the second round of the \$7500 Tucson Open golf tournament.

Metz, touring the El Rio course, where the tournament is being held, in 66 strokes—four under par—led his nearest opponents through the first round of the 72-hole tournament by a stroke.

He shaved par once on the first nine and took three more strokes off on the back nine of the par 35-35-70 course. One stroke back of the leader was Frank Stranahan, the classy Toledo, Ohio, amateur, who became familiar with the course when a student in Tucson. He was bracketed with George Schmeiter of Salt Lake City, Utah and Willie Goggin of White Plains, N. Y.

A cluster of players occupied the 68 slot.

Pelicans Open With Grizzlies

Klamath Out To Better Seasonal Record In Two Games At Ashland

Out to pad their total of 16 victories for this season, the Klamath Pelicans meet the Ashland Grizzlies in the first of a two-game cage series at Ashland tonight. The Pelis will play the Grizzlies there again Saturday night.

Already this season Klamath has defeated Ashland twice on the local court, by scores of 36 to 30 and 36 to 19.

Playing over there may be a slightly different proposition for the rangy K-men. The Ashland floor is smaller than the local court, where the majority of the Pelicans' action has been this season, and not as well lighted.

Ashland's zone defense is better suited to their home court. But Coach Dutch French is confident that if his fast break will click for a few minutes he has nothing to fear. He figures with that powerful offense in full bloom for five minutes his boys can run up a lead they can hang on to the rest of the game.

California Has Largest Bear, Deer Population

WASHINGTON, Feb. 1 (AP)—California has more black bears and Columbian black-tailed deer than any other state.

The latest tabulation of big game by the U. S. fish and wildlife service, based on a census taken at the end of 1943, shows that there were 20,190 black bear and 223,505 black-tailed deer in the Golden state.

Maine was second among the states in black bear population, with 20,000, and Oregon was a poor second to California in black-tailed deer, with 113,275.

Pete Jonas Signs Rainier Contract

SEATTLE, Feb. 1 (AP)—Pete Jonas, slated for discharge from the navy this month, is en route to his Spokane home on a seven-day leave, after stopping in at the Seattle Rainiers' ball club office and signing to play with them for 1946.

Jonas is a former Whitman college pitcher who played with the Rainiers in the Pacific Coast league before the war.

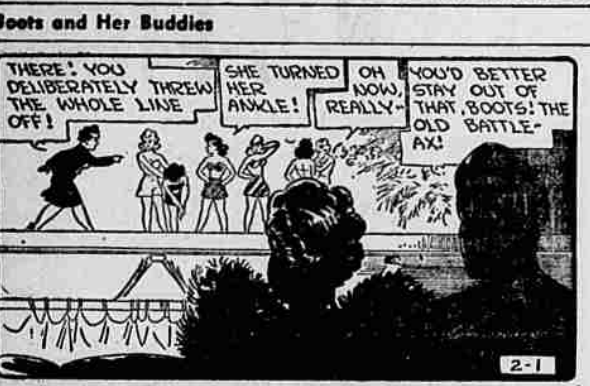
