Women Voters Hear Speaker

At the January meeting of the Klamath County League of Women Voters, members were immensely interested in hearing Lt. Col. Harlan P. Bosworth Jr. talk on his experiences in the European theater of war. After outlining the responsibilities and duties of his assignment with SHAEF (supreme headquarters allied expeditionary forces), Colonel Bosworth explained the various forms of government needed in times of war and gave details of the form set up in The Netherlands.

He told of the many careful plans made by his unit before the invasion and how these plans were carried out. Almost all of The Netherlands, twice as large as Klamath county and with a population of almost nine million, is below mean sea level and reclamation of the country after the heavy fighting there called for much work and presented many engineering problems. The speaker told many interesting stories about the difficulties encountered in languages and customs and particularly the desire of the people to continue to do things as their ancestors had done them, rather than use modern methods.
