Lawsuit For \$50,000 Filed

A lawsuit for \$50,000 damages has been filed in the circuit clerk's office by Clifford L. Frost against Gerald Findley Madison, growing out of an automobile accident on the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway July 3, 1944.

Frost maintains that he was permanently injured when his automobile was struck by a car driven by Madison, and charges that the accident was caused by negligence and carelessness on Madison's part.

The accident happened in the Hildebrand district after dark July 3. Frost states in his complaint that he had observed the approach of Madison's car and dimmed his lights. The lights

flickered off completely, however, and before Frost was able to get them burning again the cars crashed and his vehicle turned over.

Frost's injuries included a brain concussion, skull fracture, loss of his left eye, fracture of his left shoulder and fracture of the left arm, rendering him unable to work for 10 months and, he states, impairing his earning capacity permanently.

U. S. Valentine is the attorney for Frost.
