

Truman Bread-For-Europe Program Causes Rumbblings Of Opposition; Landon Blames 'Morgenthau Plan'

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—President Truman's bread-for-Europe program touched off rumbblings of opposition in congress today, and it led Alf M. Landon to contend the Roosevelt administration was partly responsible for the food shortage abroad.

First tangible hint of disapproval was the introduction of a bill by Rep. Edwin A. Hall (R-N.Y.) to ban the export of foodstuffs temporarily until it is determined that American consumers will be assured "the present amount of white bread."

Mr. Truman's plan for cutting American wheat consumption also drew questioning comment from other lawmakers unenthusiastic about the dark bread it will mean on the nation's menu.

Landon, 1936 republican nominee for president, stepped into the incipient debate by attributing the food situation in Germany, at least to what he termed, the "cruel and inhuman" plan formulated by former Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau for treatment of the conquered reich.

Contending this country had followed the Morgenthau plan, Landon told a news conference yesterday in Topeka, the United States must decide whether to "continue to feed Germany, reverse our policy, or be a modern Genghis Khan."

FDR Heritage
Describing the policy as a heritage which the late President Roosevelt had left Mr. Truman, Landon said it was "both silly and criminal" to pursue it because "it is an utter failure."

In New York, Morgenthau said: "I recommend that Mr. Landon buy a copy of my book and read it. He obviously does not know what he is talking about. I think his statement is vicious."

Mr. Truman went to Potsdam . . . the policy that followed is the result of his meeting with representatives of Great Britain and Russia.

Meanwhile, there was additional evidence of government concern over current crop. Officials who are in a position to know disclosed privately that the United States is seeking to arrange for the importation of at least 50,000 Mexican farm laborers on a temporary basis to help toward the coming harvest. The plan would be similar to that in effect during the war when the manpower pinch was tightest.

Hall, who introduced the bill running counter to Mr. Truman's proposals, is a member of the house agriculture committee. Besides seeking to assure the present amount of white bread in this country, it also would provide for distribution of sufficient grain to "areas of the United States now suffering from shortages of livestock and poultry needs."

Sympathetic
While some other farm-state congressmen say in Mr. Truman's plan the danger of new livestock and poultry shortages, many senate and house members generally were sympathetic with his aim of getting the greatest amount of food possible to starving Europe.

Chairman Elmer Thomas (D-Okla.) of the senate agricultural committee said he had received telegrams complaining that the president's plan to reduce the wheat content of bread will put 250,000 bakers "out of business."

But Thomas termed this "just one man's opinion" and added to a reporter, "I don't think anybody will be hurt by eating whole wheat bread for a while."

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Morse Opposes No-Strike Bill

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8 (AP)—Two Pacific northwest senators, a republican and a democrat, sided today against the Case bill to regulate labor disputes.

Senator Magnuson (D-Wash.) told reporters he believes the senate should "consider long and serious" before it decided to even bring up a bill with such "drastic provisions."

Senator Morse (R-Ore.) said he opposes the bill because it was "a hodge podge of restrictions that can cause more disruptions in our economy than the stabilizing effect."

"It is a manifestation of the same anti-labor hysteria which characterized public opinion following the first World War," Morse said.

"Instead of bringing labor and industry together in more harmonious labor relations it will increase economic warfare in this country."

"It will intensify class conscious struggles both economically and politically. I do not believe that such class conscious alignments are in the national interest."

Closing Days For '46 Told

Klamath Merchants association has announced 1946 closing days for stores in order that all follow the same policy.

Holidays to be observed by closing were announced as follows: Memorial Day, May 30; Independence Day, July 4; Labor Day, September 2; Thanksgiving Day, November 28; Christmas Day, December 25; also New Year's Day, January 1, 1947.
