The 49th anniversary of the Parent-Teachers association was observed Monday, February 4, at Mills school by the Klamath County Council of PTA.

An eye-witness account of the origin of this child welfare movement in 1897, inspired by Alice McLellan Birney, and backed by Phoebe Apperson Hearst, was read by Mrs. Frank Poyton, state and county PTA Founders Day chairman.

Mrs. B. C. Johnston, a past council president, asked members to carry on the spirit of the founders of PTA with parents and teachers thinking of the "A" in association representing "All of us, for all children, always."

Mrs. Johnston took pride in the early joining of the western states with the nucleus of 2000 formed in Washington D. C., in 1897, California in 1902, and Oregon, Washington and Idaho in 1905. A small group of parents grew to an association of international influence with a membership of over 3,487,000 working for a world of equal opportunity for every child.

Mrs. Lewis Hornby, Riverside president, entertained with two violin solos, with her accompanist, Mrs. Patricia Hunt. Among the many past county and local presidents attending was Klamath's first PTA president, Mrs. Burt Hawkins.

In the business session under Mrs. Ivan Crumpacker, president, the council voted to comment to local units a home and farm safety course, prepared by the American Red Cross.

Mrs. T. C. Parker of the Klamath County Public Health association urged PTA members to attend the all-day public health program February 11.

The state PTA convention will be in La Grande, April 30, May 1 and 2.

The council will sponsor in March a film depicting poor conditions in some of Oregon's schools. The film and speakers will be presented by the Oregon State Teachers association. Special invitations will be issued to city and county teachers, the AAUW, League of Women Voters, Library club and the Grange. The meeting will be open to the general public and

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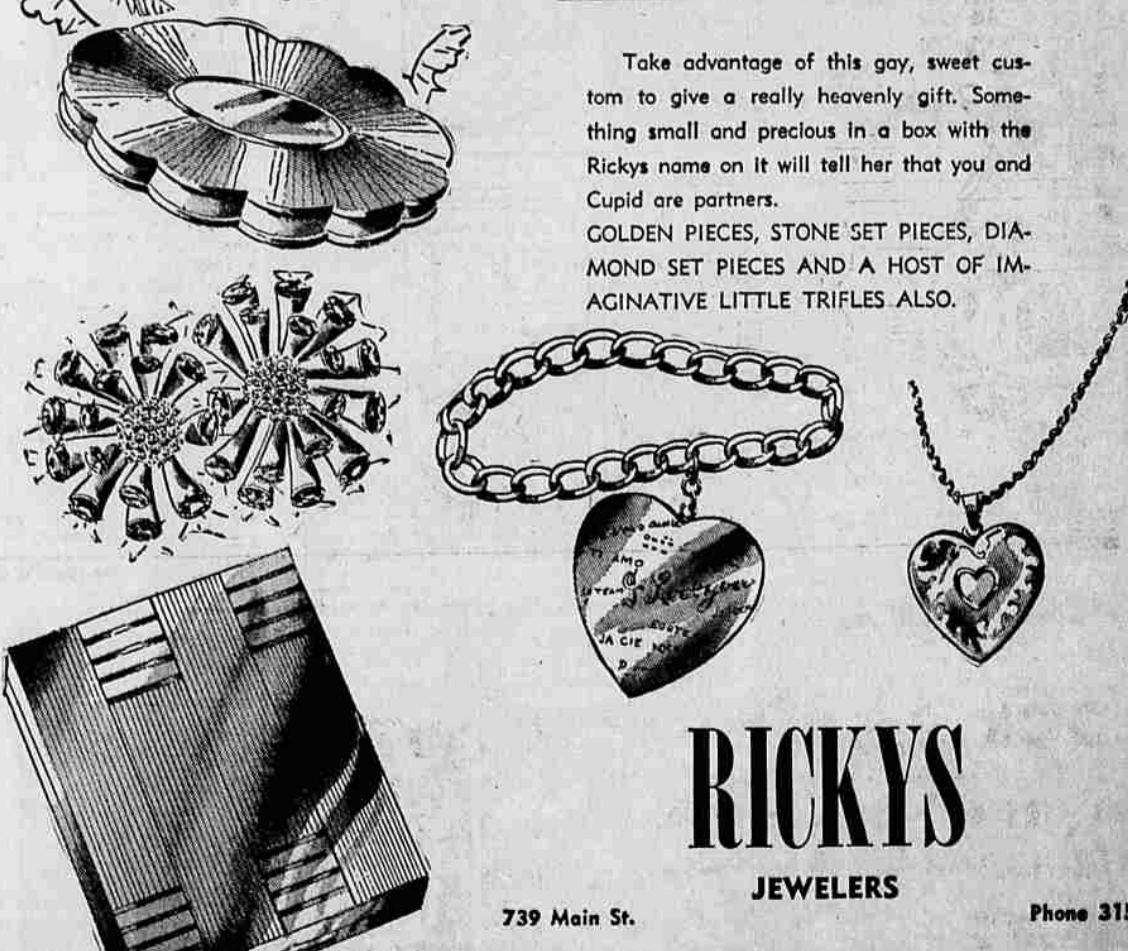
