LUXEMBOURG, Feb. 9—Here in the medieval setting of this little Grand Duchy we find one of the finest—perhaps the finest—exemplifications of the brotherhood of man which our war-torn world boasts.

The some 300,000 folk living in Luxembourg's tight 1000 square miles are just one big family, in which it's all for one and one for all. It's difficult for the stranger to understand such a Utopian situation.

The prime minister said that all Luxembourgers are related by blood. Well, of course, I don't suppose he meant that to be taken literally, but it's probably true that there aren't many people in his tiny state who aren't related if you trace their lineages back a bit.

SO there you have your Luxembourg family. Probably like most families they have differences among themselves. But let an outsider pick a row with a Luxembourger and you'll find the rest of the family coming in to the rescue.

One's first impulse on sitting down to write about this ancient state in the Ardennes highland is to try to turn some poetic sentences. There's utter fascination in the fairy-tale capital which hundreds of years ago was built as a military stronghold atop the towering rock that rises sheer from the gorge cut about it by the River Alzette.
