

Housing For Vets Talked At Meeting

The new priority system now in effect to speed construction of new houses for veterans, was discussed at the Klamath Board of Realtors meeting last week.

A poll taken of builders and contractors present to determine the extent of building planned for 1946 showed 230 houses planned. FHA State Director Folger Johnson, main speaker at the meeting, said this is the largest number planned for any of the Oregon towns he has visited.

Johnson said that he has received supplies of the application forms for "HH Housing" under the reconstruction housing program and that he has special instructions from Washington headquarters for quick handling of the applications.

Forms Available

These forms are available at all FHA offices for individual veterans who want to build their own homes, as well as for builders who want to erect one or more buildings for sale or rental for which veterans will be given preference.

The priority applications and the procedures have been designed to effect speed and efficient operation in such a manner as to assure that findings are consistent and reasonable, Johnson said. He added that his office will make every effort to avoid delay in processing the applications, and pointed out that this processing is done by the FHA without reference to the type of financing proposed.

Simplicity is stressed in the entire preference rating system. In an effort to get maximum construction of moderate-cost housing underway as speedily as possible.

The civilian production administration, through the national housing agency, delegated to the federal housing administration the task of processing the HH applications and issuing the preference ratings under which it is anticipated that about half of the critically short materials produced in 1946 will be made available for construction of homes for veterans costing \$10,000 or renting for \$80 or less.

It was emphasized by Johnson that while the \$10,000 sales price, which includes land and improvements, or the \$80 a month rental, are maximum figures, every effort will be made to encourage the production of housing at price levels as much under the \$10,000 maximum as feasible. Application forms may be obtained at the chamber of commerce.

Bogue Dale, president of the board, turned the meeting over to George McIntyre, president of the First Savings and Loan, who acted as chairman of the day. L. C. Sims, vice president of the National Housing association was the first speaker. There were 65 present, including realtors, builders and contractors.

Jordan is a native of Bandon but has lived around Chiloquin for the past six years.

Forest Work Fund Allotted

LAKEVIEW, Feb. 11 (Special)—Approximately \$30,000 has been allotted the Fremont forest service for work this year on forest roads and bridges, and work will be started as soon as weather conditions permit. The allotment, which is the largest ever received in the history of the Fremont forest service for this type of work, will be used to rebuild or replace 13 bridges and for road construction. The forest service has 2000 miles of roads in the Fremont area, and 300 miles of new construction is needed.

In addition to the above amount, extra funds will be allotted for cattle guards as soon as estimates are completed here for the work.

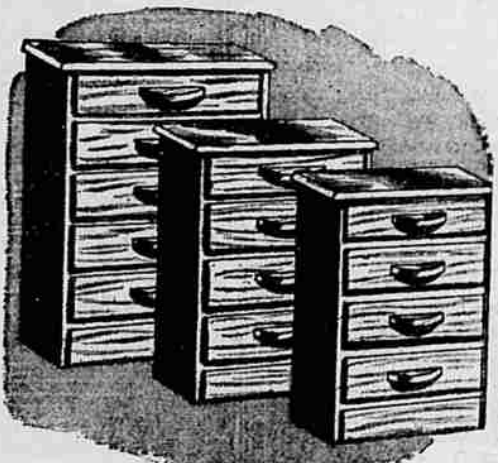

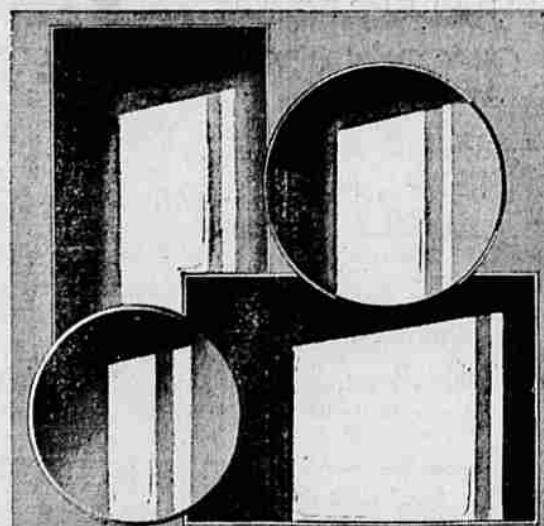

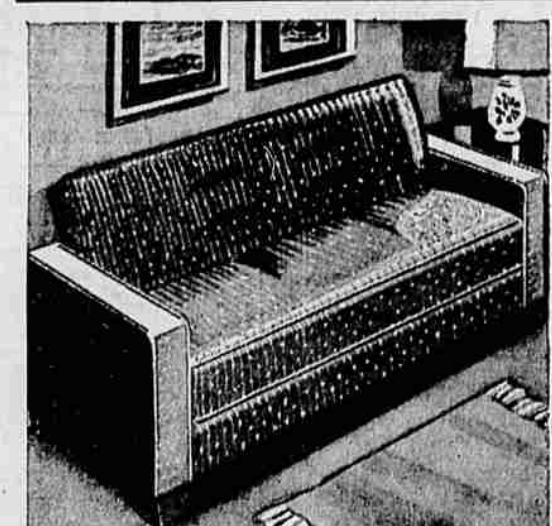
