

Equality Of Responsibilities And Privileges For Labor And Industry Strongly Favored By Klamath C Of C

Equality of both privileges and responsibilities for labor and industry was strongly favored by a majority of Klamath chamber of commerce members who participated in a poll of the membership conducted by the national affairs committee.

- The national affairs committee under leadership of Mitchell Tillotson, prepared a series of statements of suggested policy and asked for an expression of views of the membership through a mail poll.
- Opinion was unanimous on only one question, but the voting was preponderantly affirmative on all of them. The original suggestion for such a poll came from the Klamath Automobile Dealers association, to determine membership sentiment.
- Here are the questions:
1. Giving industry equal recognition with labor in privileges and responsibilities: Yes 196; No 4.
 2. Make unions subject to Sherman Anti Trust act: Yes 194; No 4.
 3. Make unions equally responsible with business for observance of contracts and requiring legal responsibility of unions: Yes 200; No 0.
 4. That benefits of unemployment compensation not be made available to persons on strike: Yes 162; No 35.
 5. Placing union contributions to political campaigns on same basis in law as contributions by corporations: Yes 194; No 2.
 6. That congress should immediately enact legislation necessary for orderly reconversion of business, demobilization of troops, occupation of foreign territories and declaring war terminated: Yes 191; No 6.
 7. Opposing fact-finding boards as not helpful in promoting amicable labor relations and not promoting national welfare: Yes 162; No 22.
 8. That congress should rapidly revert from principle of government by bureau to government by law and courts be re-established in their constitutionally intended functions: Yes 198; No 0.
 9. That congress should desist from impairing, limiting and hampering American system of free enterprise: Yes 198; No 1.
 10. That federal fiscal policy be established on balanced budget basis and local governments be required to operate on basis of decreasing rather than increasing the public debt: Yes 197; No 1.
 11. That tendency toward centralization of governments be discontinued and functions which properly should be handled by political subdivisions be returned to the states and communities: Yes 196; No 2.

Judge Blasts Booze Law In Murder Case

SEATTLE, Feb. 11 (AP)—A superior court jury convicted William J. Cooper, 47, and Edward E. Mitchell, 23, of first degree murder yesterday after deliberating less than 24 hours.

The men were accused of slaying Walter Bernard Foley Jr., described in testimony as an inspector for the Washington state liquor board.

The jury ruled against the death penalty, which, under Washington law makes life imprisonment mandatory.

After the verdict was read, Superior Judge Hugh C. Todd in a statement from the bench, blamed the state's liquor control system for the slaying.

"The privileged few may have liquor by the drink in this state," Todd told the jury. "But those not so privileged have other places—in cellars and basements and in the dark places where doors are locked."

Blames Conditions
"If no such conditions as these had existed, there would have been no murder or trial."

Mitchell, a war veteran, was accused of firing the shots which killed Foley and Cooper, a speakeasy proprietor, was charged with paying him to commit the crime.

Special Prosecutor John J. Kennett told the jury during the trial Foley was killed because he extorted a "silence bribe" from Cooper at Cooper's speakeasy.

Judge Todd continued his flaying of a liquor control system which he said, "although it is legal to have and consume liquor in this state, the opportunity to do it in a way the average American citizen likes to enjoy, in a way he wants to take his pleasure, is denied to the average man in our state."

"This traffic in dark places may only continue as the result of bribery and corruption," the judge added.

Firm Will Elect Bargaining Agent

LEWISTON, Idaho, Feb. 11 (AP)—An election to decide whether the AFL Lumber and Sawmill Workers or the CIO International Woodworkers shall be the collective bargaining agency for employees of Politech Forest, Inc., will be held March 1 to 10.

The national labor relations board granted the election petition here today.

Hugh Rosson, state director of veterans' affairs, will attend the meeting and report on his recent conferences with Gen. Omar Bradley.

Revision Of Vets' Laws To Be Talked

PORTLAND, Feb. 11 (AP)—The state legislature's interim committee on veterans affairs will discuss possible revision of Oregon veterans' laws to integrate them with federal laws at the committee's first meeting here tomorrow.

Butte Falls Hatchery Transferred To State

Transfer of the Butte Falls fish hatchery in Jackson county to the Oregon state game commission from the U. S. fish and wildlife service was completed on February 8.

The transfer included all land, buildings, troughs, grinders, cold storage plant and usual fish cultural equipment.

This will constitute one of the finest stations of the commission as it has an excellent water supply, and it will serve principally the waters in the Rogue river watershed.

The transfer was made pursuant to senate bill 131 introduced in congress by Senator Guy Gordon.

Mills Pageant Slated Friday

The spirit of five different eras of American history, from Colonial days to the present time, will be featured in the Mills all-school Valentine pageant at 7:45 p. m., Friday.

Instrumental groups will set the musical mood for each Valentine. In a heart-shaped frame will appear the sweetheart of the time, to be serenaded by the songs popular in that historical period. Dances and manners of the era will be presented by groups in gay costumes.

Taking part in the show are 150 school children. The admission charge will be 50 cents. Proceeds will be used for drapes and a rug for the teachers' room.

OPA Hampers Fir Output

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 11 (AP)—The Douglas fir belt is capable of turning out 140,000,000 board feet weekly compared with a 113,000,000-foot output now, a West Coast Lumbermen's association official told the Oregonian.

Ralph D. Brown, Seattle, in a telephone conversation with the Oregonian declared that the production boost is hindered because of OPA prices, "the uncertainty of the whole picture," and inability to foresee the situation a few months ahead.

A shortage of higher skilled labor is keenly felt in logging operations, he reported, and among sawyers, setters and trimmers in sawmills.

Industry spokesmen agreed that western Oregon and Washington mills could increase their output 15 to 24 per cent, but hesitate because of price limitations. E. C. Dwyer, Portland district director of the WCLA, declared that economic—not physical—factors are retarding production.

"Some adjustments are due between the producers' prices and his costs," he said.

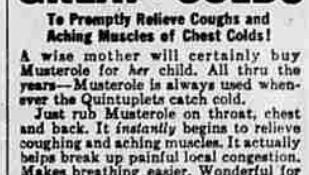

USES Says Fewer Jobs Now; More Men Wanting Them

Fewer jobs and more men wanting them. This is the situation at the U. S. employment office. Lumber and agriculture workers and veterans comprise most of the personnel seeking employment.

The unemployment compensation department is doing a rushing business and the list of veterans registering for employment with Les Finley is lengthening every day.

Only the five largest lumber companies are doing any winter work. The smaller camps are not doing any truck logging and their mills are closed down. Agriculture is at a standstill due to the weather and USES officials expect it to be another two months before industries will increase their employment rolls.

A few positions for skilled help are open now but many of the veterans entered the service with no business experience and in many cases their war training has not fitted them for civilian livelihoods. Others on the unemployment list were only employed during stress of war necessity and with qualification requirements raised they are left on the sidelines, Jack Almeter, USES Klamath Falls superintendent pointed out.

Brothels Held Disease Cause

SEATTLE, Feb. 11 (AP)—Brothels in this state "have been reopening steadily since V-J Day," Dr. Leonard A. Dewey, venereal disease control officer of the state department of health said Saturday.

He added that venereal disease among service personnel due to prostitution had risen steadily since August.

The rate of infectious syphilis in the civilian population was identical in 1943 and 1944, but there was an increase in gonorrhea, he said.

Increase in the total number of civilian venereal infections were reported, he said, in Seattle, Tacoma, Yakima, Walla Walla and Everett. Identical rates or decreases were reported from Vancouver, Bemerston, Spokane, Olympia, Aberdeen, Bellingham and Wenatchee.

Surplus Munition Dumped Into Ocean

SEATTLE, Feb. 11 (AP)—Surplus ammunition unsafe to handle or fire, is being dumped into deep water off the Washington coast, out of ordinary steamship lanes, the 13th naval district said yesterday.

The report said most dangerous ammunition left over in forward areas was being dumped there, and not brought back to the United States.

Coast guard vessels are escorting the two converted landing ships used for hauling the explosives to the dumping sites.
