"The Hunger March"

THEY called it "the hunger march." In it were people of all ages and conditions—from old men and women to babies in prams, from beggars to folk carrying valuable jewelry for barter trade.

Our chauffeur nodded as this explanation was finished and remarked that he had made the hunger march several times. He added quite incidentally that he had found a friend in a Wervershoef farm who always was ready to help the needy.

Dutch Underground Agents

WELL, we saw the family picture, and talked about everything excepting the subject which she kept evading—her benefactions. It was only when we were visiting her big cow barn—for she is a dairy farmer—that she inadvertently gave us a chance to get her story by remarking that during the Nazi occupation Dutch underground agents lived beneath the great haymow.

That broke the ice and with the chauffeur's help we got the story by hard work. The widow not only had risked her life to help the underground cause but in that same haymow hunger marchers slept every night, unaware of the agents beneath them.
