Forest Timber Cut Announced

A total of 130,116,000 board feet of timber at cost of \$667,772 was cut on the Rogue River national forest during the calendar year 1945. It was announced today by Karl L. Janouch, forest supervisor. Approximately 90,000,000 board feet were cut in Jackson county.

This was the largest cut from any national forest in the north Pacific region, Oregon and Washington, and although it was a slight decrease under 1944 it greatly surpassed any other previous year. He pointed out that 25 per cent of all national forest receipts is paid in lieu of taxes to the counties in which the national forests are located, and an additional 10 per cent is spent for road improvements within the forest.
