

Americans Write Letters To Germans Criticizing Allies, Praising Nazis

FRANKFURT, Feb. 14 (AP)—U. S. army headquarters disclosed today that Americans in the United States had written letters to Germans criticizing the allies, praising the Nazis, attacking the U. S. government and lamenting the bombing of German cities.

The army said the letters were intercepted as clandestine correspondence and added that while only a small portion of the mail was critical, that part was violently so. Correspondence in or out of Germany for Germans is forbidden at the present time.

"The end of this cursed war brought us very little joy," a resident of Buffalo, N. Y., wrote. "It began with lies and crime and ended the same way. I wonder how long this fool play of a Nuerberg trial will go. When that is over the honorable judges

can start to cut each other's throats with atomic bombs."

A U. S. army finance office employe in Los Angeles wrote: "There is no point in going into the political angle of the war. We Americans are aware of much intrigue and corrupt deceit toward our people by our government but we are helpless just as most people in any country are."

A Pennsylvanian, writing to a friend in Mannheim, said: "England's Slaves

"We are England's slaves, so we helped England in the first World War to protect her 1500 lords through American blood and four billion dollars. Thus England won the war."

"We German-Americans cannot be happy because our hearts bleed when we hear over the radio or read in the newspaper how many innocent Germans are dying of hunger and cold," a Californian wrote to a relative in Bavaria.

A letter from a resident of Oceanside, Calif., said: "In comparison with you we were well off here, but believe me nobody is happy here because the misery and want in Germany weighs heavily on all of us, even here."

"I hardly dare write because I know that the Americans are unpopular in all Europe. I cannot blame you, I know that Americans bombed Dresden last May, killing 300,000 people. That is what they call human. I could weep every day about the distress they have caused in Europe."

Cordon Miffed Over Erosion

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14 (AP)—The maritime commission notified Senator Cordon (R-Ore.) today it had no authority to pay damages caused by erosion along the Columbia river where trial runs of Liberty ships caused waves that damaged the banks of the stream.

The Sauvie island drainage district of Portland told the senator erosion damage totaled \$75,000. Cordon said both the Columbia and the Willamette river channels were damaged.

The commission said 610 vessels had been constructed at Portland and made full speed trial runs in the Columbia river, but the runs were as conservative as possible.

It said only ten ships remained to be constructed in the area.

Full-Time Church Secretary Favored

PORTLAND, Feb. 14 (AP)—An expanded program to include hiring a traveling full-time secretary to aid pastors of Oregon Protestant churches has been approved by the Oregon Council of Churches meeting here.

Delegates convened yesterday with President Charles A. Sprague, Salem, presiding, at sessions held in connection with conferences of two statewide groups.

The Oregon pastors' conference opened last night and the Oregon Council of Church Women opened sessions this morning.

CASCADE SUMMIT, Ore., Feb. 14 — Word has been received here in a telegram to Mrs. A. C. Nagel that Mrs. Addison Brewer of Camarillo, Calif., passed away last Wednesday in her home there. No details were given, but it is believed the death was sudden inasmuch as she and Mrs. Nagel had been corresponding and no mention was made of her being ill.

The Brewers are some of the pioneer summer home folks here, having come to the lake for the past 18 years for their vacations. She leaves her husband, two sons and a daughter.

Death Claims Former Prexy

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., Feb. 14 (AP)—William Allen Neilson, 78, former president of Smith college, died last night a few days after completing a history of the institution.

Dr. Neilson, who had been working on the history since his retirement in 1939, was a strong advocate of equal rights for women and men in education.

He was a native of Boune, Scotland, and began his teaching career at Upper Canada college in Toronto. He later taught at Bryn Mawr and also at Columbia and Harvard.

Brownell Raps Truman Record

NEW YORK, Feb. 14 (AP)—Herbert Brownell Jr., chairman of the republican national committee, says President Truman's record was such that it was "not surprising" some had been led to believe reports Truman would not seek re-election in 1948.

Brownell, in an address over the Mutual Broadcasting System last night, said: "Only today the newspapers reported that Mr. Truman, after less than one year in office, had informed a group of high officials that he would not be a candidate for re-election in 1948. A few hours later the chairman of the national committee (Robert Hannegan) denied that Mr. Truman made any such statement."

"I do not pretend to know whether the newspapers or Mr. Hannegan were correct, but Mr. Truman's record since he entered the White House has been such that it is not surprising that credence should be given to the newspaper report I have mentioned."

Brownell added that "we are in another period of peril and uncertainty and it would be well if we had another Lincoln in the White House."
