

Lebanon Accuses Britain And France Of Attack On Levantine Sovereignty And Calls For Evacuation Of Troops

LONDON, Feb. 15 (AP)—Lebanon accused Great Britain and France today of "a grave attack on the sovereignty" of the Levantine states and demanded the "immediate and simultaneous evacuation" of all foreign troops from Lebanese soil.

Foreign Minister Hamid Bey Frangie of Lebanon opened the debate on Syrian-Lebanese charges against Britain and France, an issue which forced the security council to remain in London as delegates to the first general assembly departed for home.

He told the 11-nation peace agency that the presence of British and French troops constitutes "a permanent menace of meddling in the internal affairs of a member of the U.N.O." and declared that their presence is "not dictated by military necessity, nor by agreement of the governments, nor by international accord."

Frangie was followed by Syrian Delegate Faris Bey El Khoury, who told the council that since the end of the war "we have made constant representations for the simultaneous withdrawal" of British and French troops "but we waited in vain."

His comment drew a reply from Foreign Minister Georges Bidault of France: "The discriminatory character that the Syrian delegate gave his remarks was superfluous and useless. There was a menacing tone of certain allegations against my country."

He asked the council to have confidence in Britain and France to solve the question themselves and asserted that the two countries did not intend to keep their troops in Syria and Lebanon indefinitely.

Speaking for Britain, Sir Alexander Cadogan said Britain desired to withdraw her troops "at the earliest possible moment." The British and French had to move armies into the Levant during the war, he said, and before the end of the war with Japan difficulties between French troops and Syrians forced the British to intervene in order to protect their communications.

Assembling Adjourns
The general assembly adjourned last night on a note of optimism, with delegates expressing belief that a firm foundation had been laid for world peace and security agreed that the new organization had made tremendous strides toward the success which the league of nations failed to attain in its turbulent career.

It will stand in adjournment until September, when it convenes in New York City, which was approved by the final session of the assembly as the temporary home of U.N.O. The assembly also approved the Westchester-Fairfield area of New York and Connecticut as the permanent seat.

Other questions disposed of last night included the holly-devoted issue of admitting labor organizations into the U.N.O. in a consultative capacity. The assembly adopted an American resolution by a vote of 32 to 6 giving advisory status to three organizations—the World Federation of Trade Unions, the International Cooperative Alliance and the American Federation of Labor.

One of the last actions of the assembly delegates was approval of a resolution calling upon member nations for "immediate and drastic" action to head off starvation in the world by conserving food supplies and increasing grain production.

Secretary-General Trygve Lie of Norway brought the first assembly to a close, declaring that although "a parliament of man" may well be a dream, "we have established a truly democratic forum for the free and open discussion of the great international, political and economic problems of our time."

SHIP EXAMINED

PORTLAND, Feb. 15 (AP)—Inspectors were examining the S. S. Jefferson Myers today after tugs succeeded in freeing the vessel from a sandbar—the second time she ran aground in two days.

The Myers is loaded with 9000 tons of wheat for UNRRA in China. If she is undamaged, the ship will continue her voyage.

Mayor Harry Cain asked a one week's postponement yesterday. A strike by the 200 members of the AFL-International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers would cut off electrical service in this city of 150,000 but union leaders have promised to maintain emergency services.

500 People Honor Hoyt

PORTLAND, Feb. 15 (AP)—Nearly 500 people were on hand last night to honor Palmer Hoyt, new Denver Post publisher who resigned from the Oregonian, at a testimonial banquet.

Dr. Peter H. Odegaard, Reed college president and main speaker, declared Hoyt would continue to serve "not merely a city or a state but a nation and a cause that transcends geography—that of peace." He described the publisher as "a counselor and a friend of tens of thousands."

Governor Earl Snell called Hoyt "an Oregon institution"; Henry R. Luce of New York, editor in chief of Time, Life and Fortune, termed him "a great light bearer." Other tributes came from Commissioner Dorothy M. Lee, acting mayor; W. Vern McKinney of the Hillsboro Argus, speaking for the upstate press; M. J. Frey, Oregonian general manager, and Donald J. Sterling, managing editor of the Oregon Journal.

Another guest was James A. Linen, publisher of Time, E. C. Sammons, president of the U. S. National bank, was toastmaster. A big silver platter, which barely held all the wires and messages honoring him, was presented to Hoyt.

CIO-IWA Men Talk Issues

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15 (AP)—The CIO International Woodworkers of America opened a conference here today, with contract cancellations listed by the president as "one of the burning issues."

In the two or three day session, union heads will discuss changes to be asked in north-west working contracts, revisable as of April 1.

President James Faddling declared that some operators cancelled the contracts but failed to enter negotiations within 15 days. "They were in duty bound to meet within the time," he asserted.
