

# Glamour Singer Scheduled Here

Belying the old-time conception of the concert singer, Jean Watson fully meets the standards of "glamour." Tall, slim, attractive, the singer who appears here Wednesday evening at the Pelican theatre, under the auspices of the Klamath Community Concert association, impresses her audience with her sophisticated appearances as well as with her true contralto voice of three octave range, coloratura flexibility, warmth and fullness.

Turning her graphic abilities, which at the age of 17 won her first prize in an art contest, to practical use Miss Watson generally designs her own clothes which are executed for her by Helen Fredericks of New York. Gloves, shoes, powder and perfume are custom made for the singer who prefers striking lines and colors and whose well proportioned figure and natural clothes taste justify them. Believing that the correct costume is an important element in the artistic perfection of a performance, Miss Watson chooses deep, glowing colors and graceful draped lines for her recital dresses while her gowns for oratorio appearances are either black or white and of classic simplicity. Velvet, long gloves and trains are typical items in the Watson wardrobe.

The contralto's jewelry tastes are consistent, garnets are her favorite, and her collection includes both new and old stones in both modern and antique settings.

Contrary to the starvation rules of most singers, Miss Watson eats a hearty dinner before her concert and needs never worry about gaining weight even though she avoids salads whenever possible. For exercise, the singer finds only walking and dancing enjoyable and is an especially fine rumba and samba dancer.

She is extremely proud of her two brothers, both of whom are members of a famous Canadian regiment. Her hobby is collecting little woodcarved animals to commemorate her visits to the cities to which her concerts take her.
