Primary elections this year will be held May 17. Henry Semon, veteran Klamath legislator, has filed for re-nomination on the democratic ballot and Rose Poole is expected to seek re-nomination on the republican ballot.

Semon has been in the state house of representatives since 1933 and Mrs. Poole is serving her first term of office.

Wally Hector filed for the republican nomination for county surveyor last week, and Frank Z. Howard, the present office

holder, may announce his intentions shortly.

Fred Pope of Fort Klamath is the only candidate so far for county commissioner. Pope is seeking reelection on the republican ballot.

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
