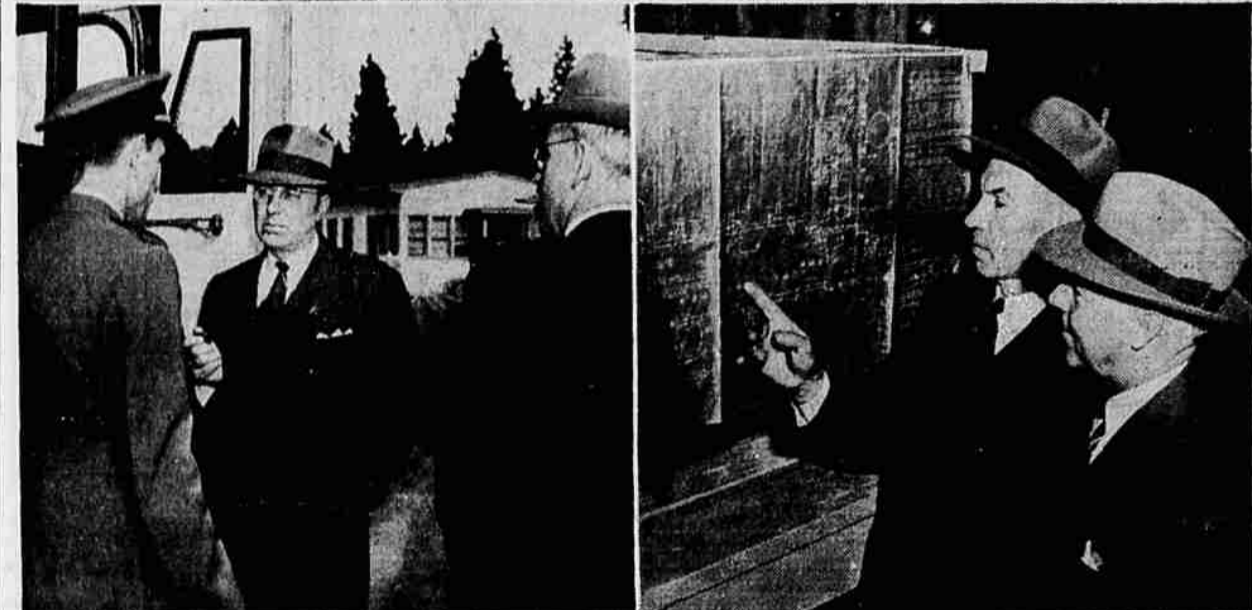
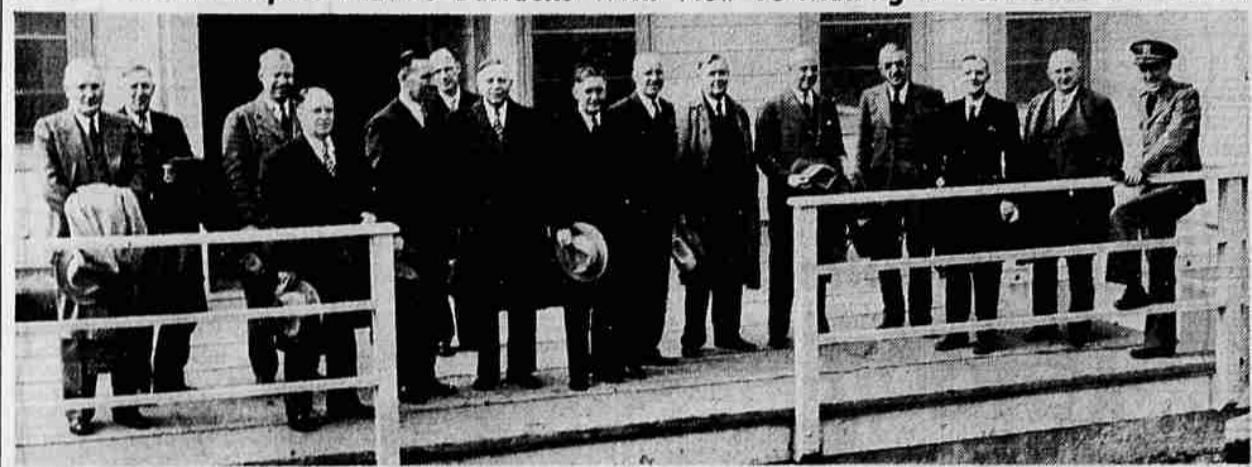

Governor Earl Snell announced his candidacy for re-election as governor of the state of Oregon Saturday. A Republican, Snell was first elected governor in 1941 after having served two terms as secretary of state.

Casualties Estimated At 250 Killed; 1300 Hurt

BOMBAY, Sunday, Feb. 24 (AP)—Troops opened fire on Indian civilians again last night. Late unofficial reports placed the death toll at 250 and the total of injured at "well over 1300" in the three-day clashes.

BOMBAY, Feb. 23 (AP)—The British announced breaking of the royal Indian navy mutiny both ashore and afloat at Bombay today amid continuing civil disorders.

Battle Mobs
British troops and Indian police battled street mobs. "On the whole," said a British communique issued in Bombay, "the situation shows improvement. Today rioting occurred in some areas of the city and there has been serious rioting in the mill area."

General headquarters in New Delhi announced that the striking Indian seamen, numbering about 12,000, both in barracked barracks in Bombay and aboard scores of small war vessels in the harbor had yielded unconditionally at 9 a. m.

Confident
Expressing his confidence in a rapidly expanding Oregon, Governor Snell concluded his statement by saying, "I have been too close to the people of this state during their all-out war effort not to have complete faith and confidence in the future of Oregon."

KODIAK, Alaska, Feb. 23 (AP)—The SS. Puente Hills, towing the aft end of the broken Russian tanker Donbass with its human cargo of 23 persons who refused to be taken off, fought increasing gales south of the Aleutians today attempting to ride out the storm, the navy's Alaska sea frontier reported.

Five Buildings Blazed By Fire
MUSKEGON, Mich., Feb. 23 (AP)—Two thirds of a block in the city's business district lay a mangled mass of ruins after a fire loss of \$1,500,000, which destroyed five buildings, including 254 feet along a main business street, were destroyed. No one was injured.

Red Army Told To Add Might

MOSCOW, Feb. 23 (AP)—Generalissimo Stalin and Marshal Georgi Zhukov told the red army on its 28th birthday today that it must not rest on its laurels, but must strengthen its military might.

Argentine Voters To Swamp Polls
BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 23 (AP)—Argentina's turbulent presidential campaign entered a compulsory 24-hour "cooling off" period today, as a record total of more than 3,000,000 voters prepared to go to the polls tomorrow in the nation's first general election since 1937.

Loan Foes Get New Ammunition
WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—Senate foes of the proposed British loan found fresh ammunition for their fight today in the disclosure that American surplus and lend-lease goods have been turned over to Britain in a war-end settlement bringing only 11 cents on the dollar.

Japanese Export Program Slated
TOKYO, Sunday, Feb. 24 (AP)—Acting to ease Japan's immediate, critical need for food and industrial imports, General MacArthur today announced a Japanese export program about 25 per cent of that in prewar years.

Capt. McVay Found Guilty

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—The navy announced today Capt. Charles B. McVay 3rd, was guilty of negligence when the cruiser Indianapolis went down with the loss of 880 lives, but that his sentence was remitted "in view of his previous outstanding record."

Pepper Favors Pauley Ouster

CHICAGO, Feb. 23 (AP)—Senator Claude Pepper (D-Fla.) today told a press conference that in his opinion, Edwin W. Pauley, nominated for under-secretary of navy, should ask President Truman for permission to withdraw his name.

Truman Visits Quantico Base

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23 (AP)—President Truman was an unannounced visitor today at the marine base at Quantico, Va. He went ashore with his military aide, Brig. Gen. Harry Vaughan, from the yacht Williamsburg, and took a brisk breakfast walk around the post.

Gallows Claim Jap War Lord

MANILA, Feb. 23 (AP)—Lt. Gen. Tomoyuki Yamashita, one-time bemedalled conqueror of Singapore, was hanged on a flood-lighted gallows before dawn today as a Japanese war criminal, wearing patched and slouchy American khaki fatigues.

13 Detained In Spy Ring Quiz

OTTAWA, Feb. 23 (AP)—Council for the royal commission investigating espionage activities said today that 11 men and two women had been detained in the inquiry and "it is apparent that it may be necessary to request that additional persons may be interrogated."

Bill Would Halt Draft By Creating Volunteer Army

CAIRO, Feb. 23 (AP)—Students at Foad and Azhar universities, estimated to number 25,000, began a three-day boycott of their classes today in what their leaders termed an expression of mourning for Egyptians killed in anti-British riots Thursday.
