Rumors Fly As Tulalake Vote Nears

TULALAKE, Feb. 25—Rumors flew here this week in political circles as the date for the city election, April 9, approaches. Votes are set for three council seats and city clerk council and treasurer. Two long-term and one short-term of four and two years on the council are open. Registration closes at noon Thursday.

Retiring members of the council are Mayor Clarence Schott; Al Porter, an appointee for the four-year term, and Arthur Prince. Porter is up for re-election and Prince, who is leaving for the south, will not be in the running. Charles Card, co-manager of the Tulalake hotel, is mentioned as a possible aspirant for council.

Hold-Overs
Hold-over members are Dick Moore, Tulalake druggist, and Ralph Fausett, electrician, both two years to go.

Two names, Victoria Thaler, incumbent and Mrs. Naomi Kurtz, are mentioned for clerk. Mrs. Sara Welsh, Tulalake newspaper woman, is said to be in the running for the treasurer's office, resigned recently by Alice Micka.

The proposed street improvement program which called for floating of a bond issue will not be blocked out in time for a place on the ballot. It is expected a special election will be called in the late spring. The issue will bring to the attention of the voters a 3-point plan—the surfacing of Main street, installation of curbs and gutters, and a storm sewer system. Amount of the proposed issue has not yet been made public.

Robson is still on three year's probation from a larceny charge and is still waiting to be drafted. The youth, who will be 19 years old the last day of February, went to Canada for a visit two days before he was to be inducted last July and was refused admission back into this country by immigration officials until last week on the grounds that he was Canadian born and had been convicted of a felony in this country.
