

# Coast Road Scheduled To Reopen

SALEM, Feb. 25 (AP)—The Oregon coast highway, blocked for three weeks, was scheduled for reopening today with the clearing of slides near Manzanita and Florence.

The state highway commission said they expect to have the Manzanita slide cleared by noon. This slide occurred December 6 and caused one-way traffic restrictions, but three weeks ago it took out a section of the road, causing traffic to be detoured via the Sunset and Necanicum highways.

The slide 12 miles north of Florence occurred Saturday, blocking the road. No detour was available, so traffic on the road was halted.

The commission said the Florence slide should be cleared some time today, and that the Manzanita section would be opened early this afternoon.

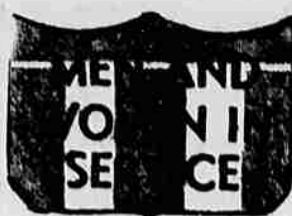
### 4-Man Group Buys Pendleton Airways

# Death Claims Noted Author

TOPEKA, Kas., Feb. 25 (AP)—The Rev. Charles M. Sheldon, prominent Kansas clergyman, lecturer and editor, and author of the famed religious novel "In His Steps," died last night in a Topeka hospital.

Dr. Sheldon, who would have been 89 tomorrow, had suffered a cerebral hemorrhage last Monday.

"In His Steps," written in 1896, a few years after he had moved to Topeka, sold more than 23 million copies and was translated into 16 languages, but a faulty copyright prevented Dr. Sheldon from collecting any royalties from the book, which reportedly ranks next to the Bible in number of copies sold.

One-time editor of the Christian Herald, Dr. Sheldon edited the Topeka Daily Capital for a week in a manner which "believes Jesus would run it on earth." Circulation of the paper, normally about 1000, increased to 370,000 during the week.
