

4-H Program Aided Nation During War

The 4-H club program helped mobilize young people at home to aid in the gigantic task of aiding the nation during the war, Francis A. Skinner, club agent, stated today.

How well they responded is shown by the splendid record since Pearl Harbor. Four-H members produced enough food to feed three million fighters for a year, bought or sold \$200,000,000 worth of bonds, collected untold tons of scrap fat, paper and metal. Klamath county 4-H members contributed their share toward the national record reached, Skinner said, in recognition of work done during 4-H Week.

Inheritance Tax Refused

SALEM, Feb. 27 (AP)—A person can't pay his own inheritance tax before he dies, Attorney General George Neuner ruled today.

An unusual man, 81 years old, asked State Treasurer Leslie Scott if he could pay the inheritance tax on his own estate, valued at from \$350,000 to \$400,000.

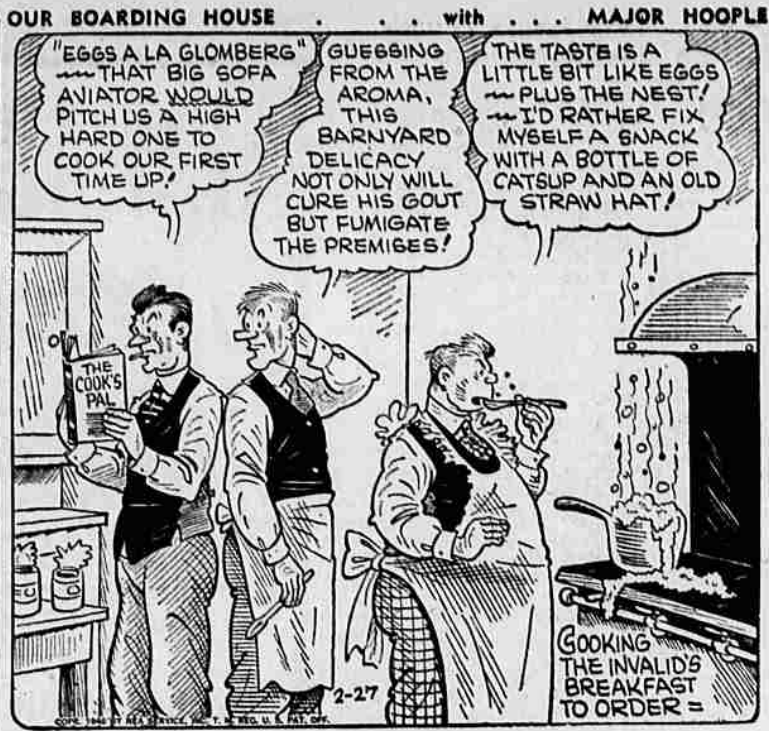
The man wrote: "I would like to have my affairs arranged in good order, therefore I am writing to inquire whether or not I can pay now inheritance tax on \$300,000. Should the estate not be appraised at that, you keep the balance. If appraised at more, then my executors will pay the surplus."

Neuner ruled that there is no law permitting such an advance payment, so the tax will have to be paid after the man dies.

PENDLETON, Feb. 27 (AP)—Pendleton field will be declared excess to army air forces, according to telegrams received by the East Oregonian here late yesterday from Rep. Lowell Stockman and Senator Guy Cordon.

The telegrams said final action is expected this week to make available to army service forces the field where Jimmy Doolittle's Tokyo bombers received much of their early training. If the field is not claimed by service forces or other army forces it will be declared surplus to the war department and assigned to the war assets corporation for disposal.

Snow depth at the rim of Crater Lake was recorded at 17 feet yesterday. Thomas C. Parker, assistant superintendent of the park, reported that there is no figure available on the water content of the snow at the rim.

At Annie springs, the snow depth is 15 feet 4 inches with a water content of 62 inches, and at park headquarters the snow depth is 16 feet and the water content 68 inches.

Varied Results Shown In Potato Seed Inspection

Varied results were shown in the potato seed certification inspection on 280 lots of Oregon plantings at Ocean side, Calif., February 21 and 22.

Walter Jendrzejewski, assistant Klamath county agent, together with about 50 Klamath basin growers and dealers, attended the inspection made by W. R. Jackman, extension specialist on farm crops, OSC, J. R. McCambridge, seed certification specialist for OSC, and J. L. Milbrath, associate plant pathologist, OSC.

Plants were up in fine shape and it was easy to determine presence of disease and make a good inspection, Jendrzejewski stated.

Results on Klamath plantings are being mailed to growers and results on all Oregon plantings may be had at the county agent's office. California results will be available at the office soon, it was announced.
