

Washington's Birthday Noted

Washington's birthday was commemorated by the Soroptmist club at the weekly luncheon Thursday. Tribute was paid to the Father of our Country and comparison drawn between the world relations when this government was inaugurated and the world of today. The club read in unison the preamble to the charter of the United Nations Organization.

The honor guest, Dr. J. W. Ellison of Oregon State college, gave a short talk on world conditions and brought forcefully to mind the urgency of the uniting of the nations of the world into an international government, if we are to prevent another and far more serious war than the one just closed. His topic was, "We Stand at the Crossroads—One World or No World." Dr. Ellison stated that something must be done, and that quickly, or the end of civilization might become a fact. He considered the only solution to be a world government and higher standards of living for everyone in the world, in fact a social order so much higher and more Christian than we have at present that there would be no further incentive for one nation to make war on another.

Dr. Ellison's talk was most interesting and enlightening, and he had a very appreciative audience. In answering many questions put to him, he was very earnest and insisted that every service club and every organization could help in this new missionary work by trying to interest his fellow-citizens in this idea of a world organization for peace. Dr. Ellison's talk was not all serious. He brought in several humorous stories and his audience was delighted to listen to him.

Coral Sabo was program chairman for the day and introduced Dr. Ellison. Other guests of the club were Mrs. L. L. Truax, Mrs. Sam Rife, Mrs. Ray Lamb and Mrs. Orpha Smith. Interesting letters were read from Effie Garcelon and Laura Bertram, members, who are in California this winter.

Loaf: 2 lbs. lean beef, ground; 2 tbsps. bacon fat or butter; 3 tbsps. minced onion; 3 tbsps. minced green pepper; 2 cups soft bread crumbs; 1/2 tsp. salt; 1/2 tsp. pepper; 2 tbsps. Worcestershire sauce; 1 tsp. dry mustard; 1 can Del Monte Tomato Sauce; 6 eggs.

Serve in squares or until eggs are delicately baked and set. Ingredients for the sauce, add meat which was scooped out of the loaf, bring to a full boil. Then simmer for 15 minutes. This unusual meat loaf will get many an encore. Serves 6 or 8.
