### Many Disappointed Young Fighters Left After Bouts

CHICAGO, Feb. 28 (AP)—There were a lot of disappointed former Golden Gloves stars on the sidelines today as 32 survivors of the 19th annual tournament of champions in Chicago's Golden Gloves tournament prepared for the semi-finals to be held in Chicago stadium on March 8.

Even a national AAU champion, Heavyweight Charles Lester of Cleveland, was sidelined during the continued flurry of excitement that marked last night's 32 quarter-final bouts and kept 10,375 fans on the edges of their seats for more than four hours.

Lester was defeated by a former Golden Gloves champion, Orlan Ott, of Twin Falls, Ida., in a bout in which a boxer beat a slugger.

The 32 survivors, four in each class, will fight twice in the finals of the tournament of champions, with the winners meeting the champions of New York's tournament in the annual east-west amateur boxing extravaganza in Manhattan.

Just which of the four survivors in each class will be paired will not be known until drawings are made prior to the semi-finals March 8.

A registered shoot will be held at Wocus each month until the meet. The shooters' scores will grade them in classes A, B, C or D.

Last Sunday the largest crowd of the year turned out for the shooting, and over 7000 targets were used. The coming registered firing will begin at 10:50 a. m. There will be one trap operating for gunners who do not want their counts registered.

### Gale Bishop Makes Deal With Braves

BELLINGHAM, Feb. 27 (AP)—Gale Bishop, Washington State's All-America basketball player, told the Herald yesterday he has made a deal for himself with the Boston Braves of the National league.

Bishop's announcement, made from his father's farm at Sumas, north of here, definitely removed him from the Washington State lineup in its northern division Pacific coast conference basketball game with the University of Idaho at Moscow Saturday night. It also foreclosed his prospects of winning the division individual scoring top.

The signing of one of basketball's greatest scoring machines by the Boston club came as a surprise both to Bishop and his friends here.

He came home from college early in the week to study of offers from the Brooklyn Dodgers, New York Yankees, Detroit Tigers, and Philadelphia Phillies and said he was pondering their proposals when Boston "came in with an offer that I couldn't turn down."

Bishop said he will receive a "nice bonus" from the Braves, but parried inquiries as to the amount except to say it was "double figures."

### Army's Powerhouse Being Broken Up

WEST POINT, N. Y., Feb. 28 (AP)—Army's great football team, undefeated and untied last two years, will be broken up after this season.

Doc Blanchard and Glenn Davis, All-Americans, along with at least nine other players, will become seniors on June 5 when the U. S. military academy reconverts from a wartime to a peacetime basis.

### UNRRA Purchases 5 Fishing Boats

TACOMA, Feb. 28 (AP)—Five fishing boats built on Puget Sound including three which were constructed here, have been purchased by the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration to aid China's shattered fishing industry.

Sol Lischinsky, UNRRA agricultural equipment division, in making the announcement, named the three Tacoma boats as the 64-foot North Star, the 70-foot North Pacific and the 70-foot North Cape.

## Rickey Fumes Over Players Going Mexican

NEW YORK, Feb. 28 (AP)—Branch Rickey, president of the Brooklyn Dodgers, today urged Commissioner A. B. "Happy" Chandler to take strong action against major league players who jump from organized baseball to the Mexican league.

Rickey did not mention any names, but it is likely he was fuming over the loss of Luis Olmo, hard-hitting outfielder, who sent back his Dodger contract unsigned and announced he would play in the Mexican circuit.

"Organized baseball should adopt a policy in regard to players who jump their contracts," Rickey declared at the Dodgers' training camp in Sandford, Fla. "Our contracts are valid and players who disregard them should be Mexican players for the rest of their lives."

Meantime, in an interview at Tampa, Chandler took a blast at colleges who have proposed that their players be left alone by big league scouts until they graduate.

"Only about one-third of the colleges play baseball," Chandler pointed out. "If they want us to go along with their proposals they should give baseball a bigger place in their sports picture and not let other sports encroach on the game."
