South Pass Opening To Be Commemorated In Klamath

A centennial celebration will be held in Klamath Falls this year commemorating the opening of the South Pass to Oregon 100 years ago.

General approval for such a celebration was evidenced both by a group of interested citizens which met at the chamber of commerce and by the Klamath Falls Historical society.

The society went on record as approving the commemoration of this historical event, with suggestions for a pageant of some sort. It was decided to hold whatever form of celebration decided upon before September 15, and invite neighboring communities and counties of southern Oregon and northern California to participate.

Making the celebration a civic enterprise was approved. Plans at this stage are only tentative. Another meeting will be held in the near future to outline a more definite program.

The date of the next meeting will be announced and representatives of churches, lodges and civic organizations will be invited to be present and offer suggestions.
