Aid Given On Tax Reports

During the past two weeks between 150 and 225 persons a day have been helped at the local internal revenue service office in making out income tax reports.

Chairs have been put in the hall of the second floor post office building to accommodate the increasing number of persons seeking assistance with this yearly chore.

All persons filing on the calendar year basis, having a statutory gross income of \$500 or more are required to file a return before March 15, 1946. Anyone who has not yet filed is welcome to seek advice or assistance from the deputy collector.

The office, room 201, post office building, is open regularly Monday through Friday from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., and will be open Saturdays, March 2 and March 9 at these same hours in order to give taxpayers additional assistance during the present income tax filing period. It will also be open until 9 p. m. Thursday, March 14, and until midnight, Friday, March 15, it was announced today.

Newsmen To Tour Plants In Klamath

A. F. Kempe concluded arrangements for the newsmen's tour of industrial plants in Klamath Falls on his visit here Monday. Kempe is the manager of the Oregon office of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Representatives of Oregon newspapers, press correspondents and radio newsmen will start the tour in Klamath Falls arriving Sunday, March 3. The object of this program is to study reconversion in industrial plants throughout the state and inform the public through qualified news sources of the findings.

The men will arrive Sunday afternoon and meet for a social get-together at 5:30. They will stay at the Willard and meet at 8:30 a. m. Monday, visiting Weyerhaeuser Timber company and Klamath Machine and Locomotive company at 10:15.

The first half hour at each plant will be spent in a press conference and the second half hour in a short comprehensive tour of the plant.

There will be time before and after lunch for stories to be written and filed. Arrangements have been made for Merle West of Big Lakes Box company and a member of the chamber of commerce board of directors, to speak at the luncheon in the Pelican party room. Heads of local lumber industries have been invited to attend and answer questions of the newsmen.

At 3:30 p. m. the group will proceed to Medford where they will remain the night and visit Bear Creek Orchards and the American Fruit Growers company Tuesday morning. Tues-
