Road May Be Opened Saturday

SALEM, March 1 (AP)—State highway crews, removing yesterday's third and fourth slides from the Multnomah falls on the Columbia River highway, probably will get the road reopened Saturday. State Highway Engineer R. H. Baldoek said today.

Baldoek said there were two slides yesterday amounting to 5000 and 3000 cubic yards.

He said engineers completed construction today of a drainage system that will take the water out of the saturated soil during February rain. It will clear about 400,000 cubic yards of rock and mud across the road and railroad tracks.

In two or three days of good weather, Baldoek said the highway commission will have cleared the slide problem by diverting future slides away from the road and tracks.

The Coast highway at Multnomah falls, where the road has been opening toward the sea, won't be reopened until next week. There still is enough pavement for one-way traffic, the condition is not solid enough.

Troops Due To Arrive At 5 Ports

Six transports, carrying 6054 returning service personnel, are scheduled to arrive today at three Pacific coast points while four more vessels are due to dock at two east coast ports with 5795 men.

In addition, one ship with 2374 war brides and children, is expected at New York.

West coast arrivals include: Seattle, Wash., one ship, 1369; San Francisco, four vessels, 4641; San Diego, Calif., one transport, 44.

Arriving at New York are three ships, 5792; Norfolk, Va., one vessel, three.

Ships and units arriving: At New York—Madawaska Victory from Le Havre (due originally yesterday), 1407 troops, including 563rd anti-aircraft artillery air warning battalion; 770th field artillery battalion; 25 nurses; 43 Wacs; four navy personnel.

Gen. G. O. Squier from Le Havre, 3273 troops, including 137th evacuation hospital; 1109th engineer combat group; 681st quartermaster laundry company; 815th anti-aircraft artillery automatic weapons battalion; 69th armored field artillery battalion; 4366th quartermaster bakery company; 340th quartermaster depot supply company; 84 nurses.
