Sledding Mishap Fatal To Boy

A sledding accident last Saturday resulted in death to Robert Milo Huston, four-and-one-half year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Milo G. Huston of Gilchrist. The child rode his sled out from an alley near his home beneath the rear wheels of a passing truck, state police reported. The accident happened shortly before 3 p. m., and the boy died that night at St. Charles hospital in Bend. Police said the truck was driven by William Ernest Jones, 32, of 421 Portland avenue, Bend. He was exonerated of any blame in the tragedy after investigation was made by State Officer Frank Chapman, who said Jones was not driving more than five miles an hour when the accident occurred and a high snow bank obscured the boy's view.

Other placards said "We are picketing the British consulate!" "Mr. Atlee, remember the four freedoms," and "American seaman demand freedom for Indonesia."
