Body Okays Vocational Training

Ten apprenticeship indentures and nine vocational training memorandums for veterans and trades and industries students were approved at the regular meeting of the Klamath Falls apprenticeship council this week. The recommendations will be immediately submitted to the state apprenticeship council and state department of vocational education for final approval.

Under the state plan, part-time vocational students at Klamath Union high school and returning veterans are receiving vocational training on the job in various trades and industries. Apprenticeship trades are those requiring more than 4000 hours to learn, while vocational training memorandums are issued for shorter training periods.

The trainee in either case earns a percentage of the journeyman's prevailing rate of pay which increases according to his journeyman rating. If the apprentice is a veteran of World War II, he may, under this program, receive additional training benefits for the veterans administration.

Prentice, auto painter, Klamath Auto Body shop; Dexter E. Sexton, shipping clerk, Zellerbach Paper company; Robert P. McHenry, circulation clerk, Herald and News Publishing company, and James McFarland, mortician, Ward's Klamath Funeral home, all trades and industries students.

Harold Teale, director of vocational education, said he estimated Klamath Falls would soon have 75 veterans taking advantage of this type of training, and that there are now 60 of the trades and industries students.
