

OPA Price Ceilings And Weather Hamper Logging Operations In This Area

Spring logging operations in the Klamath valley depends generally on the weather and the OPA. That is the gist of opinion gained from the various lumbering concerns here.

Most logging camps have been open all winter, the work slowed down but not stopped by the snows, but lumbermen appear leary of predicting any great speed-up of operations until some relief from price ceilings is received.

The Big Lakes camp at Seven Mile will probably open between April 1 and 15, depending on the

weather. Right now there is over six feet of snow reported there and Big Lakes has enough logs on the pond to last until the middle of April.

That camp will employ about 90 men, and the only new equipment bought for it is a new D-8 tractor.

Open All Winter

The Ewauna camp at Sprague River was not closed all winter but with the coming of spring a few new men may be put to work on additional road building. The camp has a crew of about 125 men and no new equipment has been purchased. Weyerhaeuser officials expect an increase in truck spot logging but no additional cuts. Camps 4 and 6 are open now, but a few truck drivers may be hired this spring.

The company's payroll increase will come in the summer when railroad-building crews go to work, taking up old rails and putting down new ones. Operations at the Ivory Pine company camp near Bly may get underway by the end of this month, officials said depending on the snow and condition of roads now thawing. A new road was built last summer with the expectation of logging all winter but heavy snows forced the operations to be curtailed.

Speed-Up Seen

A speed-up at Pelican Bay's camp at Sycan may come with the spring but there is no additional hiring to be done or equipment needed. At present the snow is about four feet deep at Sycan.

The Finney Logging company has a couple of jobs in north California waiting for a break in the weather but probably will not have to hire any more men except perhaps a few truck drivers or road workers.

Yanks Arrest Red Leaders

BERLIN, March 7 (AP)—The American military government has arrested 12 German communist leaders in Schoenberg borough, in the United States sector of Berlin, and charged them with intimidating German civil officials in promoting a proposed merger of communist and social democratic parties.

Maj. Gen. Ray W. Barker, American commander in Berlin, said the military government

found these communists were "attempting to put pressure on civil officials."

He said the arrested politicians would be tried in military courts on charges of "interfering with the business of the civil government and attempting to intimidate civil officials."

This crackdown came a few days after the rank and file of social democrats, especially in the American, British and French zones, had revolted against their leadership which had agreed to merge with the communists. The merger is scheduled to be made formally

effective in the Soviet zone April 21.

Twins Killed In Car Crash

LOUISVILLE, Ky., March 7 (AP)—William R. Flood and Charles Andrew Flood, 20, Louisville twins, who enlisted in the navy together, fought together and were discharged together, died together in an automobile crash near here today.

Deputy Jefferson County Coroner Joseph Beck said William was killed outright when his automobile plunged from the highway and that Charles died within a few minutes after police arrived.

William saw action in 16 major engagements in the Pacific, part of the time on the aircraft carrier Langley. Charles wore nine battle stars earned as a gunner's mate.
