

# pt. Wood Manage owers

**TULELAKE, March 7**—Capt. C. Wood, recently commander at Camp White, will assume the duties of manager of the Tulelake area beginning May 10, it was announced Tuesday night at the most widely attended meetings of the organization within recent months.

Walter A. Main, president of growers, made the arrangement. Wood, who will be charged prior to coming, has been highly recommended. Main stated, and is qualified to assume the responsibilities of the area. A college graduate, he has been associated with the life in the midwest for a number of years, later served as a high school principal, and had years of experience in managing the public.

Growers covered problems from the proposed change in grades on potatoes to 1946 harvest labor problems and heard reports on the certification meeting held recently at Oceanside. Growers opposed the proposed changes in grades that have been suggested by the USDA, which would make four grades instead of two on commercial lots and also smaller packages. Rose reported interest in

It is proposed this ground be operated in connection with a federal experimental station near there. The experiments will be operated under the supervision of agricultural officials of the various states.

Main and French Johnson represented Tulelake at the meeting held February 21 at Carlsbad when Victor Cusick, secretary of the California agricultural and resources committee, explained how the San Diego chamber of commerce could help secure the proposed purchase.

While the prospects on migrant farm workers for the 1946 potato harvest is better than last year, it is too early to determine how many Mexican nationals California can expect. Dale West of the Cal-Ore Packing company asked for contracts on 800 acres of onions this year for the Basic Dehydrating company of Vacaville at the 1945 price of \$2.50 per cwt. Seed potato prices will remain good for at least three years, it is expected, and there will be a strong demand for brewing barley and clover seed.

Hugh Wilson, district manager of the Spreckels Sugar company, Sacramento; Guy Manuel, agricultural superintendent; Austin Armen, agricultural engineer, and A. L. Knudsen, labor superintendent, were here to interest growers in production of sugar beets.

Discussion of the permanent camp for transient labor will be taken up at the next general meeting late this month. One hundred seventy-five growers attended.
