

# 10 Transports Scheduled To Arrive On West Coast; 6 Due On East Seaboard

**By The Associated Press**  
Ten transports, carrying 11,163 service personnel, are scheduled to arrive today at three west coast ports while 5676 more men are due to debark from six vessels at two east coast ports.

Pacific coast arrivals include: Seattle, Wash., one ship, 12; San Diego, Calif., one vessel, 1354; San Francisco, eight transports, 9927.

Arriving at New York are five ships with 5675. One vessel with a lone soldier is due at Norfolk, Va.

## France Proposes 4-Power Confab

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—France has proposed a four-power conference to discuss the questions of central administrative agencies in Germany and permanent separation of the Ruhr and Rhineland areas from the Reich.

The state department disclosed this today, making public letters exchanged between Secretary of State Byrnes and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault. The letters were released simultaneously in Paris.

Bidault said the proposal had also been made to Russia and Britain.

## Cardinal Glennon Failing Rapidly

DUBLIN, March 8 (AP)—John Cardinal Glennon has fallen into a semi-comatose state and "anything can be expected," his secretary, Monsignor John P. Cody, said tonight.

Mrs. Cody, chancellor of the St. Louis diocese, said the cardinal's condition "is not so good this evening as earlier" in the day when it was announced he had developed uremia and exhibited mental confusion.

Two doctors were in almost constant attendance — Commodore Alphonse McMahon, USNR, who accompanied him on his trip from St. Louis to Rome, where Glennon was elevated to the Purple Heart 18 days ago, and Dr. Henry Moore of Mater hospital. Two nurses also were at the bedside.

## Soviets Deny Stripping Korea

SEOUL, March 8 (AP)—Russians deny any stripping of Japanese industrial properties from Korea, Lt. Gen. John R. Hodge reported today in a statement which also disclosed the basic points on which Soviet-American efforts to unify the currently divided country had split.

Russian delegates to a joint conference here, the American commandant declared in his formal statement, asserted that "So far as they knew, no removals of capital goods were taking place, and that in any event it was a matter for regulation by a command in his own zone." They declined to discuss the topic further.
