

Churchill Has Narrow Escape

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Winston Churchill—a man who wore out his admirers but not his welcome—rolled into Washington with his party this morning after laughing off a narrow escape from an old-fashioned accident in the colonial town of Williamsburg.

A suddenly-frightened pair of dray horses bucked, reared and plunged yesterday, and almost ran away with an ancient, flimsy open coach in which Churchill and General Dwight Eisenhower, U. S. army chief of staff, were seated.

Frantic efforts of bewigged and colonial-costumed negro coachmen finally quieted the horses. Then Churchill, puffing a black cigar and apparently unperturbed, and Eisenhower, obviously worried about the British statesman's safety, climbed to the ground.

The near accident evidently was due to the bright flash of photographers' bulbs.

Apologetically, John D. Rockefeller, 3rd, Churchill's host on the sight-seeing tour of the town, later told him that "I am afraid we've let you down."

He didn't say whether he meant that literally.

Finland Chooses New President

HELSINKI, Finland, March 9 (AP)—Finland's parliament chose Premier Juhani K. Paasikivi president of Finland today, succeeding Baron Gustaf Mannerheim who registered recently.

Paasikivi received 159 votes, while Finland's first president, K. J. Stahlbert, received 14 votes. Eleven ballots were blank. He was elected to finish Mannerheim's term which runs until March, 1950.

Paasikivi, who is 75, has devoted close to 40 years in the service of his country. Finns generally emphasize that Paasikivi has shown ability in dealing with the Russians.

Youths Buy Bike Licenses

Spring must be practically here, at least as far as Klamath Falls bicyclists are concerned. Today the office of the police judge in the city hall had a rush of youngsters, all buying 1946 bicycle licenses.

The licenses cost 50 cents and last for a period of two years. Chief of Police Orville Hamilton urges that all bicyclists get their licenses as soon as possible and added that they come under the same driving restrictions as do motorists. "Signals on left or right turns should be made the same as a motorist does. In riding a bicycle the rider should bear in mind that the motorist is no mind reader, and unless the bicycle is ridden on the right side in traffic lanes, and the proper signals given, a serious accident may result."

Ellsworth Flays Housing Bill

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—The housing bill passed by the house Thursday places "in the hands of one man more power and more control" over Americans than ever given to "any one man or agency or government before," Rep. Ellsworth (R-Ore.) declared today.

The representative said in a statement the measure was enacted by a "tired house of representatives" which had "resisted" pressure and propaganda for two weeks.

"Many house members reluctantly voted for the bill hoping the senate will clean it up and make a decent bill of it—and they voted to thus get rid of it in its present form," Ellsworth said. "I considered the bill an unusually bad piece of legislation and voted against it."

Labor Front Appears Quiet

 The nation's labor front, after a week marked by threatening strikes against the nation's communications and railroad systems, appeared comparatively quiet—and somewhat brighter—today.

The postponing of a walkout of nearly 300,000 railroad workers, scheduled for Monday, after President Truman named a fact-finding board, followed settlement on Thursday of the wage dispute involving some 250,000 telephone workers.

As 17,300 Western Electric company employes in New York and New Jersey ended their 65-day strike, Special Mediator Arthur S. Meyer in New York expressed hope a settlement might be reached soon in the 53-day work stoppage of 100,000 General Electric company employes.

Earlier, Neil Brant of Washington, representative of the CIO United Electrical Workers union, told striking employes of the Westinghouse company at Mansfield, O., that the company's 75,000 strikers would be back "in a couple of days" if they were offered hourly wage increases of 1 1/2 cents. The union had demanded 25 cents.

Wall Seeks Council Seat

Departing from the usual procedure of filing for candidacy for a place in city government in late summer, E. F. Wall, 1010 Hanks, this week filed his candidacy for a place on the city council.

Wall is a candidate for the post of council representative from ward five, now filled by Rollin Cantoral.

Two other places on the city council, wards one and three, will be up for election in November. Councilmen from these districts at the present time are Charles P. Van Doren, who was chosen to fill the place left by the resignation of J. J. Keller last fall, and Harvey Martin.

The office of police judge, now filled by Harold Franey, will also be on the ballot in the November city election.

Ice Floes Smash 55 Cottages

BAY CITY, Mich., March 9 (AP)—Towering ice flows hurled inshore by a suddenly shifting wind seeping across Saginaw bay severely damaged at least 55 cottages early today along the fashionable resorts of Killarney and Ricomo beaches.

State police said there were no reports of injuries. One cot-

lage burned when overturned by the gorging ice, upsetting an oil stove.

The wind-blown, churning ice ranged from ground level to a height of some 40 feet. In many sections the towering floes topped the summer cottages, which currently are occupied because of the housing shortage.
