

Pravda Claims Anglo-American Pact Would Liquidate UNO, End Big Three And Bring Return To Power Politics

MOSCOW, March 11 (AP)—Pravda declared today that Winston Churchill's proposal for a British-American military alliance would liquidate the United Nations, end the coalition of three big powers and bring a return to power politics.

Breaking the Russian editorial silence on Churchill's March 5 speech, the three-column front-page editorial asserted it had been a failure, adding:

"No false speeches about democracy and freedom by convinced reactionaries such as Churchill and his American friends from the Vandenberg camp will succeed in drawing people onto the road to new wars being prepared for them."

The communist party newspaper said Churchill had "mobilized his whole arsenal of oratorical art" to put over his point but had only succeeded in revealing himself as out of step with the times.

"One must unwillingly recall the Churchill of the period after World War one," Pravda said. Then, it said, he was the "initiator of an anti-Soviet campaign and the principal organizer of armed intervention against the Soviet Union."

During the war, Pravda said, Churchill "pretended to be a friend of the Soviet people" but now that the danger was over he was revealing his "real feelings" and was "galloping on his old horse" again.

Pravda said that by his proposal for creation of a British-American military alliance Churchill "frankly states that this military alliance must be directed against the USSR, against that power which bore on its shoulders the main burden of the struggle and played a decisive role in the defeat of Hitler Germany."

"But a military alliance of two participants of a coalition against a third signifies the liquidation of the coalition of the three great powers formed during the course of the second World war."

Liquidation Of UNO
"He openly proclaims power politics which must be realized by an Anglo-American military alliance. To whom is it not clear that all of this, as a matter of fact, means nothing else than the liquidation of the United Nations organization?"

"So with another stroke he settles with an organization which he in his capacity of an ardent defender championed."

Pravda said Churchill's proposal amounted to a plan for British-American rule of the world "behind the back of the UNO."

The former prime minister realized that he lacked the power to carry out such far-reaching plans, Pravda said, and there-

Mid-Pacific Army Commander To Quit

HONOLULU, Saturday, March 11 (AP)—Lt. Gen. Robert C. Richardson Jr., announced last night he will relinquish command of army forces in mid-Pacific March 17 and return to the mainland for reassignment, after which he will retire from the army.

The general, who took over the Hawaiian department in June, 1943, around the midpoint of the Pacific war, did not disclose when his retirement would become effective.

In his car, witnessed the death. The officer reported Doyle P. Baughman, Rt. 1, Albany, said he was blinded by lights of other cars on the highway at the time and did not see Gerecke. The impact of the body snapped on the auto motor hood and temporarily blocked the highway from view, but Baughman succeeded in keeping the car on the highway, police reported.

Another Struck
About fifteen minutes later, Ralph Faulkner, Rt. 1, Albany, was struck at the scene of the fatality while attempting to flag
