

Freak Wreck Injures Man

Orville Gess Jr., Dairy, Ore., was taken to Klamath Valley hospital for treatment of minor cuts and bruises and then booked by police for reckless driving after his car jumped a curb, sideswiped a tree, struck a power pole guy wire and turned over shortly after midnight last night.

He paid a \$50 fine this morning. The freak accident occurred on Upham between Worden and Sargent.

Investigating police reported that Gess was driving north up 11th, and made the turn onto Upham. About 30 feet above the intersection his car jumped the curb, crossed the sidewalk, traveled about 120 feet and hit the tree.

That didn't stop the vehicle. It plunged on another 120 feet and smashed into a slanting guy wire, careened and turned over on its top. Gess was slightly injured and Gene B. McKay, 3511 Altamont, a passenger during the wild ride, was uninjured.

The car was making an estimated 50 miles an hour when it headed for the curb, police reported, and skid marks showed from the street to where the car finally came to rest.

Hot Campaign Fires Voters

SEATTLE, March 11 (AP)—Fired by one of the hottest election campaigns in recent Seattle political history, more than 100,000 voters are expected to participate tomorrow in a municipal election featured by the mayoralty contest, a \$10,000,000 school bond issue and firemen's plea for a shorter week.

Observers estimated today that the election campaign has been the most expensive in years with rival factions using all media at their disposal to get their points before the electorate.

Mayor William F. Devin, who is seeking a third term, is being opposed for reelection by Victor A. Meyers, lieutenant governor.

Mac Sees Wife Of Bataan Foe

TOKYO, March 11 (AP)—General MacArthur today received at her own convenience—Mrs. Masaharu Homma, and promised her that he would consider carefully all the facts in the case before he would permit her husband's execution by an American firing squad.

The allied commander in a half-hour interview told the wife of his Bataan foe of 1941-42 that he "understood and sympathized" when she informed him it would be a great loss to the world if Lt. Gen. Homma were executed.

MacArthur now is reviewing the case; and his word will be final. He can uphold—or ease—the sentence.

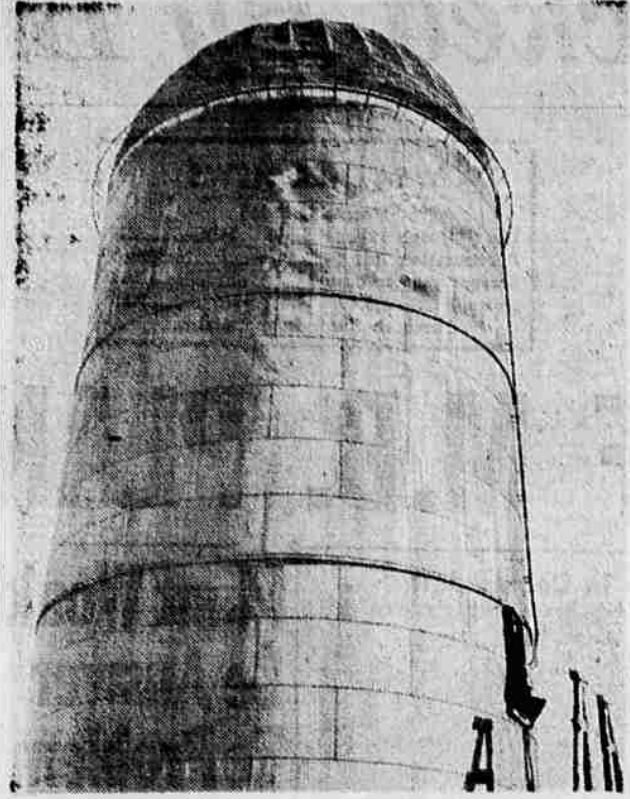

Big Mill Burner Cools Off



The burner at the Weyerhaeuser Timber company mill west of town, which no longer sheds a red glow at night from burning waste. Weyerhaeuser has discontinued burning the waste in the burner, hogging it instead for power plant use.

Weyerhaeuser Mill Burner No Longer To Be Utilized

No longer will the red glow of burning waste be visible at the top of the burner at Weyerhaeuser Timber company's plant here. Erected in 1929, the burner has now served its purpose, and is totally disconnected from all conveyors that used to carry slash and slabs to the fire which has always been an integral part of sawmilling.

Replacing the burner is a new system of conveyors which carries what was formerly waste through two "hogs" to be ground up into chips and returned to the powerhouse for fuel. While a certain amount of hogged fuel has been made and utilized since the mill was built, the addition of a second hog eliminates the necessity of waste burning from which no benefit is derived other than cleaning up an accumulation of sticks, bark, sawdust and slabs.

Fuel Stored

The fuel is stored in the powerhouse or in an outside storage yard and is used to generate steam which runs the generator producing electricity. The method is another milestone in waste elimination in lumber manufacture.

Lewis Calls Policy Group

John L. Lewis summoned his 250-man policy committee today to chart demands he will present to bituminous coal operators in negotiations opening tomorrow in Washington.

Lewis' AFL United Mine Workers union, representing 400,000 employees of the soft coal industry, already has taken legal preliminaries to a strike, should negotiations on a contract to replace the one expiring April 1 fail.

A royalty on each ton of coal mined, which would be placed in the union welfare and hospitalization fund, was expected to be one of Lewis' chief demands. Also likely were proposals for a shorter work week, without a proportionate loss in earnings, and recognition of a UMW union for supervisory workers, including mine foremen.
