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Building Will Be Ready Soon

The wheels of progress were turning out at Bly this week as the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company building neared completion. Charles Seavey, manager of the company, said the concrete and brick structure would house an unattended automatic exchange to serve the Bly area.

The building should be ready for use in 30 days, Seavey said. This is the first rural exchange in Klamath county built by Pacific Telephone and Telegraph. Due to delay in getting equipment, the date the building will be put to use has not been announced, Seavey said. The Bly exchange serves 35 families at the present time and as time goes on additional facilities for furnishing telephone service will be possible, he added.

Until 1938, Bly had no telephone service. That year the first switchboard was installed but it was only a toll station. The new building is located next to the Logger's Club.

Women Mail Carriers Now Past History

The familiar wartime sight of a woman bent under the weight of a mail pouch trudging up the hills in Klamath Falls is now past history.

There have been no women employed at the local post office for outside work since late in 1945, Bert E. Hawkins, postmaster, said today. During the war about half a dozen women were used as city mail carriers for various lengths of time. The work was heavy and most of them didn't last more than a week or so.

Four veterans have recently been added to the staff, Hawkins stated, some working as clerks and some as carriers, rounding out the regular full time staff.

Paul Skeen Accepts Post With Board Of Education

Paul Skeen, Klamath Falls businessman, was appointed a member of the board of education, District No. 2, at a meeting of both boards last night in KUHHS. Skeen was present to accept the appointment. He fills the vacancy left by the resignation of Arthur Dickson who has moved his residence out of the district.

Skeen has been active in various youth activities and is married and the father of two children.

Bids for the construction of an addition at Fremont school, rejected last fall on the grounds that they were too high, were called for again at approval of the boards last night. Bids will be published immediately, according to Superintendent Arnold Gralapp. Plans now call for a new unit to embrace dressing and shower rooms for boys and girls physical education, addition to the manual training department and art and music rooms. The district authorized \$26,000 for the new project a year ago.

The boards voted to set the date of school opening in the fall of 1946, as of September 9, a little later than the past several years. This is the average opening date of all southern Oregon schools, Gralapp said.

Howard Perrin, architect, discussed with the boards the proposed vocational addition to the high school and displayed plans for the structure.
