dress shirts, cotton underwear,
slacks or sports coats.
But in all fairness to our town,
merchandise buyers who have
rummaged around Portland, Los
Angeles and San Francisco say
that Klamath Falls is in better
shape as to men's clothing than
any of the larger places.
So a jaunt to Portland for
clothes wouldn't net the price of
gasoline used in getting there.
Sell Quickly
Dealers here get in a few suits
occasionally but sell out almost
before they put on the price
tags. Slacks, overcoats and dress
shirts go about the same way.
Clothing estimate it will be
late in 1947 or possibly two
years before a man can walk
into a store and choose a suit
from a selection of prices, styles
and patterns.
Only rarely does a shipment
of shirts, pajamas or underwear
come in, and the supply of over-
alls amounts to about five per
cent of the demand. A few light-
weight work pants and very few
work shirts are to be purchased.
Leather Jackets
Every store has some leather
jackets on hand, army releases
in the main, and recently some
trench coats have been put on
display, also army release. Light
summer cloth jackets are also
available generally, though not
in any prewar quantity.
Suede jackets are out of the
picture entirely, except for one
or two here and there. Suede is
an imported material and none
is being brought in.
Hats are harder to get now
than last year, and good wool
sweaters are on the scarce list.
Good shoes are still scarce al-
though there is generally a fair

supply of cheaper footwear. That
commodity is easier now than
last year due to cut-down of
army orders.
Socks and ties are about the
only items of men's apparel not
feeling the pinch.
Reasons for the shortages are
too numerous to inquire into,
but generally stated the prob-
lem involves 1943 prices and
1946 costs.

Camp Fire Girls, Inc., one of
the oldest organizations in Amer-
ica for young girls, marks its
34th anniversary March 17, the
first day of Camp Fire Week.
With "At Home in the World"
as their theme, Blue Birds, Camp
Fire Girls, and Horizon clubbers,
the three age classifications
served by the organization, will
feature a program dramatizing
the international aspects of fam-
ily, friendship, and understand-
ing.
Exhibits, special meetings, and
a grand council fire, March 22,
will highlight the week, with
events planned to create an un-
derstanding of the cultures and
ways of life in other lands. The
cultivation of friendship with
the youth of other nations will
be stressed through personal and

group correspondence of the
nation-wide membership.
Since 1912, the date of its in-
corporation, Camp Fire has
served millions of girls in the
United States where it origi-
nated and in other countries
around the world.
Ethyl Bremer, local Camp
Fire executive secretary, states
that "Camp Fire is gearing itself
now to the activities of a peace-
time world, and it is putting into
practice a program designed to
help young girls fulfill the obli-
gations of responsible citizen-
ship, and enlarge and strengthen
their understanding of world
culture, by emphasizing the im-
portance of total family partici-
pation in its activities."

**Col. Goldsworthy
Stops in Klamath**
Lt. Col. Robert Goldsworthy
stopped in Klamath Falls Wed-
nesday en route to San Francisco
for re-assignment, to visit with
his friends Major and Mrs. John
M. Clayton Jr. He continued
his journey Thursday.
Col. Goldsworthy's home is
in Rosalia, Wash. He was pilot

of the first B-29 fighter plane
to be shot down over Tokyo. He
was one of the three survivors
of the crew of 12 shot down
December 3, 1944, on a flight
from Saipan. The crew bailed
out when the plane was disabled
and he was captured and put in
solitary confinement for five
months. Later he was moved to
Omori prison camp outside
Tokyo where they remained in
special confinement until lib-
erated by the U. S. navy August
29, 1945. He was returned to
the U. S. by hospital plane Sep-
tember 20, 1945.
