Cole Sues To Recover Land

James B. Cole, 80, has filed an equity suit with the circuit clerk to recover the title to land which he deeded to his sister, Mrs. Lovie C. Clark, after he was injured in an automobile accident last year.

The land is situated about a mile past the Weed-Ashland junction and just off the Keno road.

Cole alleges that he deeded the property to Mrs. Clark shortly after he was injured, not knowing what the outcome of the injury would be, and that he wanted her to have the property in the event of his death.

The deed was made as a matter of convenience and that it was not supported by any material consideration.

Since that time, however, Cole has had an opportunity to sell the land and has asked his sister to sign a deed so that the sale might be made.

She refused, the suit continues, to sign such a deed or to deed the property back to Cole.

U. S. Balentine is Cole's attorney.

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KF Man Seeks Ranch Title

Daniel Fitzgerald, local stockman, has filed an equity suit with the circuit clerk to acquire the title to the Murdoch ranch near Keno or for \$35,000 punitive damages in case the court decides not to uphold a contract allegedly agreed upon by Fitzgerald and Christine Foss Murdoch, owner of the land.

Fitzgerald contends that on March 8 he agreed to buy the ranch from Mrs. Murdoch for \$21,000, to be paid \$5000 cash and \$2000 a year, and that he gave her \$100 to be applied on the down payment.

On March 12, the deeds and papers necessary for the sale were drawn up and ready for signature, but on the following day, the stockman says, Mrs. Murdoch informed him that she had decided not to sell or carry out the agreement. The papers were not signed.

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Land Bid Opening March 25

Bids will be opened March 25 at 10 a. m. in the U. S. bureau of reclamation office, post office building for land leases on the 1270 acres of land in the Tulelake division, the bureau said today.

This land is in the Tulelake area formerly used for the Jap gardens of the WRA camp and will be leased for grazing and agricultural purposes only.

Sealed proposals will be received from honorably discharged veterans of World War 2 only and these veterans must not now be lessees of project public lands. Leases will be for the period from March 26, 1946, to December 31, 1946.

Homestead Entry

The lands to be leased will be opened by the United States for homestead entry during 1946, it was stated.

No potatoes shall be grown on these lands during the term of lease and lands now in alfalfa must be left in alfalfa throughout the lease.

The local office of the bureau has been busy this week answering inquiries regarding the lands to be leased in Lower Klamath lake area. Bids on this project will be open March 20.

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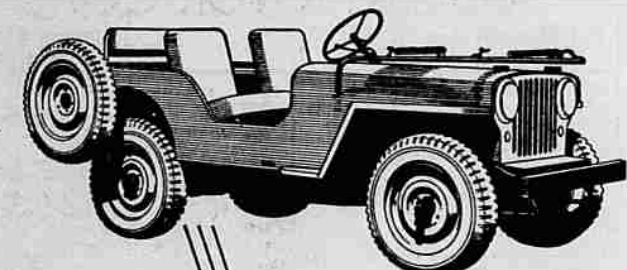
