

Vets To Get Home Care In Oregon

WASHINGTON, March 18 (AP)—Ex-GIs with service-connected disabilities will soon get "home town care" in three more states—Washington, Oregon and North Carolina, the Veterans Administration announced today.

This, VA said, will raise to seven the number of states in which veterans needing outpatient care may be treated in their own communities when the administration's clinical facilities are not available.

The other states are Kansas, Michigan, California and New Jersey.

Dr. Paul R. Hawley, VA's chief medical director, also announced that contracts had been signed for veterans to use private hospital beds in North Carolina and Oregon.

Reporting he had been assured the hospital plans will be in operation in both states in 30 days, Hawley said approximately 1500 beds will be available in 180 North Carolina hospitals and 1100 in some 60 Oregon hospitals.

SP Plans To Abandon Line

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The line proposed to be abandoned extends from near Gates to the end of the line at Idanha, about 20 miles.

The application said the federal government plans to build a dam on the north Santiam river at a point about six miles downstream from Detroit. When the dam is constructed, about eight miles of the line will be submerged, the carrier said, adding that the remaining portion will be useless for railroad purposes.

Extension Unit News

Klamath county home extension unit members who are also members of an international organization called "Associated Countrywomen of the World" have made a donation amounting to over \$40 to help re-establish a system of help and counsel for homemakers in Norway, according to Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, county home demonstration agent. Mrs. Earl Mack of Henley is chairman of the county home extension alumni group sponsoring the work of the ACWW in Klamath county.

Women's educational organizations in Norway, as in many other European countries, are not financed with government funds, so that it requires private capital to make it possible to carry on the work of lectures and demonstrations on helpful phases of homemaking and family care.

The \$40 collected in Klamath county will be combined with the money offered from other parts of the United States, and, through the Associated Country Women's organization, will be distributed in the Scandinavian country to the best advantage in re-establishing the work of home economics education.

Mrs. E. E. Kilpatrick of Merrill is the vice chairman of the alumni group, and Mrs. Lee Holliday of Fairhaven is secretary and treasurer.

Purpose of the ACWW is to promote friendship and understanding between women in different countries. Letters from English women to Oregon homemakers are being read at each of the extension unit meetings in the county. Mrs. Gillen stated that any woman in the county who is interested in corresponding with women in any other country should contact Mrs. Mack or Mrs. Holliday.

Warden May Ask Earlier Closure

ST. HELENS, March 18 (AP)—District Fire Warden Edward Schroeder today reported he may ask the governor to close areas near here earlier than usual after a fern fire swept 12 acres in Dutch canyon.

Schroeder, whose district includes Columbia, Clatsop, Washington, Tillamook and Yamhill counties, said the fire season is ordinarily declared on May 15, but condition of some areas warrants earlier action. He said the last legislature granted the governor authority to declare closure of areas any time after Feb. 1.

Miss Boardman was born in Cleveland Oct. 12, 1860. Her survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Murrey Crane, Diller, Mass., and Mrs. Florence Kneeling, Washington.

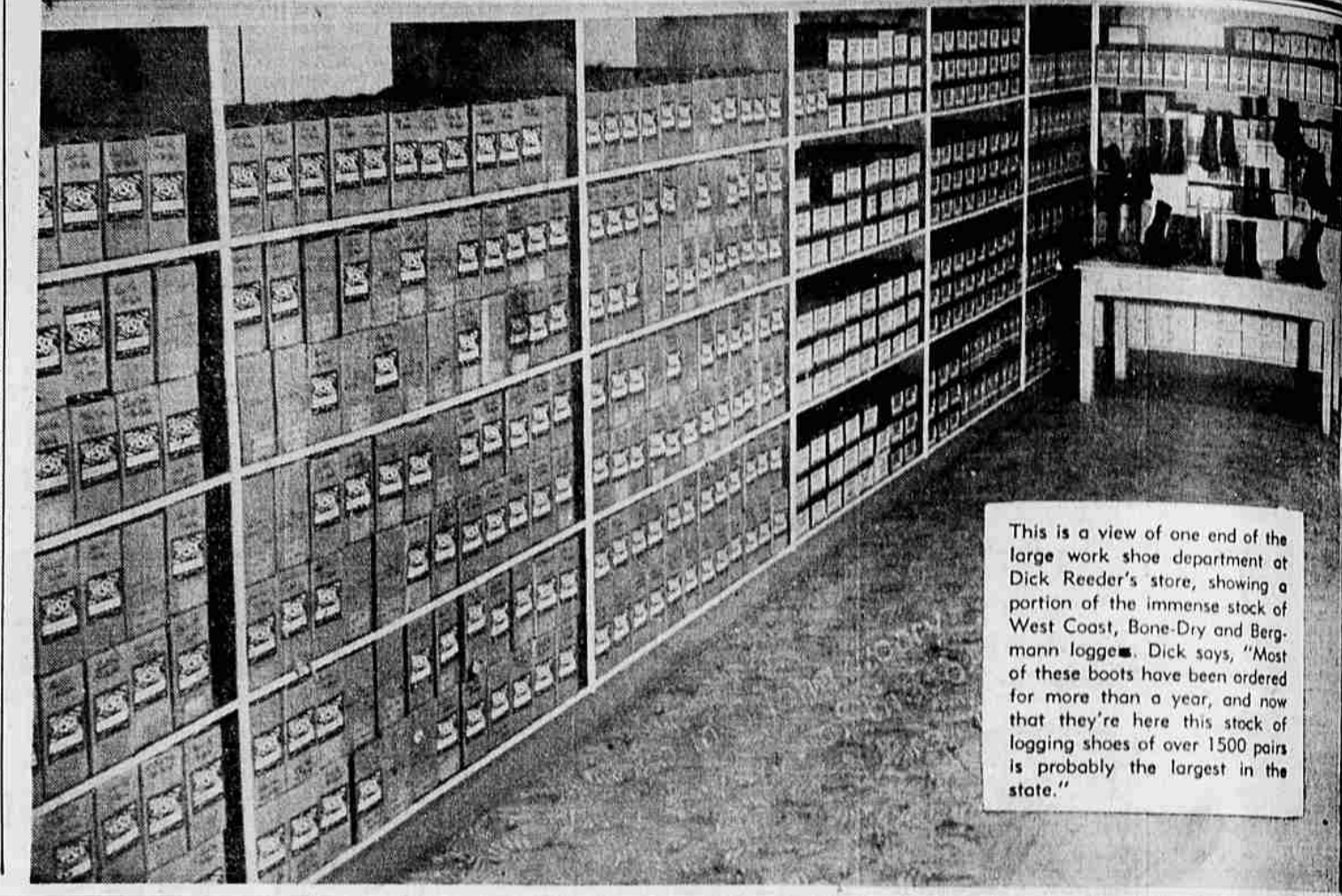
