

# County Road Surfacing On Ballot

GRANTS PASS, March 19 (P) Josephine county taxpayers will be asked at the May 17 primary election to vote a special six mill levy for the surfacing of county roads.

This levy, said County Commissioner L. M. Mitchell today, will raise about \$66,000 for the purpose. The levy will be of a serial nature, and if voted would be levied each year for three years.

The budget committee, in an all-day session with the county court yesterday, foresaw that it will be able to balance the 1946-47 budget within the 6 per cent limitation in spite of skyrocketing costs, and made five recommendations to the court, of which the serial levy was the first.

The other four recommendations are: Fine quarters outside the courthouse for the county health unit and the welfare office to make additional filing and work space for the county clerk's office and the assessor's office; install, on arrival, photographic copying equipment to record pictorially the hundreds of deeds which the clerk and assessor offices must now copy by typewriter; arrange for a monthly audit of all county department finances to facilitate checks on the status of the various departments; increase the price of timber sold by the county from \$2.25 to \$3.50 per thousand feet for fir, from \$5.25 to \$6.25 on pine, from \$6.50 to \$7.50 on sugar pine and from \$8 to \$12 on white cedar.

# Mott Basin To Be Dedicated

WASHINGTON, March 19 (P) Members of the Oregon delegation in the house plan to return home next month to participate in the dedication of Mott Basin at the Tongue Point naval station in memory of the late Rep. James Mott.

Mott, during his years in the house, continuously urged construction of the Tongue Point station.

The house members who will attend the dedication are Representatives Ellsworth, Angel, Stockman and Norblad, all republicans. Norblad succeeded Mott.

# AAA Sign-Up Due March 20

Klamath county farmers are to be notified by individual letters of dates for each community to sign up individual AAA farm plans. Any farmer, whether owner, tenant or share cropper may participate in the 1946 conservation program if he signs one of these AAA farm plans previous to May 1, 1946.

This sign-up is entirely voluntary and those who sign the farm plans become members of the Klamath County Agricultural Conservation association, agree to follow conservation methods of farming and participate in the payments provided for carrying out certain farm practices which have been performed during the program year and are recorded in reports at the close of the year. These payments represent the national interest in the conservation of our soil and water resources.

Farmers from each community are asked to come in to the county AAA office starting March 20. County and community committees will be on hand to assist in making out the farm plans on these dates.

# Former KF Resident Claimed By Death

YREKA, Calif., March 19—George Frederick (Fred) Parker, 75, former Klamath Falls resident and timber worker, died Sunday, March 17, at Siskiyou County General hospital here, following an illness of the past three weeks. He was born November 26, 1870, in Springfield, Ore., and had lived most of his life in and around Eugene. A sister, Mrs. C. E. Chandler of Klamath Falls, survives. Final rites will be conducted Wednesday at 2 p. m. from Gardner Funeral chapel in Yreka, with interment in Evergreen cemetery.

# 2 New Hooch Rulings Set

PORTLAND, March 19 (P)—The state liquor control commission today listed two new rulings aimed at curtailing speculative sales of beer taverns which Administrator R. T. Conway earlier said was "almost a racket."

Conway announced yesterday "license places have been changing hands repeatedly, in some instances as many as three times in a month, at material increases in sales prices each time." He explained the rulings would slow the sale turn over to a minimum of 90 days.

The first ruling: "In a change in ownership, no operation will be permitted until the new purchaser has been granted a license by the commission and the former license submitted to the commission for cancellation."

The second ruling: "After a change in ownership no new change in ownership application will be received by the commission for a period of 90 days."

# Morse Hails Return Of La Follette

WASHINGTON, March 19 (P) Senator Wayne Morse (R-Ore.) says Senator LaFollette, Wisconsin progressive, will be able to "carry on his fight for the common men and women" in the republican party.

LaFollette and other Wisconsin progressives voted on Sunday to abandon the progressive standard and cast their strength with the republicans.

"I said last July," Morse declared in a statement, "that the republican party would welcome Bob LaFollette back in to the party. The reaction of many republicans on Capitol Hill today overwhelmingly supports that prediction.

"Sound liberalism as an administrative policy is dead in the democratic party. Political machine control, vote-catching expediency and playing both ends against the middle characterize the politics of the democratic administration.

"In the republican party we

must guard against a coalition of republican and democratic actionaries who believe that private enterprise systems synonymous with a political sense to the economic structure exploit the economic structure against that vicious party on his fight for the common men and women of the republican party."
