

Klamath Women Discover Home Sewing An Economy

Home sewing is a wise economy. That is the conclusion of the 18 Klamath women who made garments for the coat and suit workshop in Klamath Falls, Oregon, during February. According to Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, county home demonstration agent, Lucy Lane, and textiles specialist at Oregon State college, Mrs. Gillen in conducting workshops.

Twelve women will blossom in the spring suits as a result of the "instruction by doing" workshop, held at the Roosevelt High School in Klamath Falls, and at the Civic Improvement club in Klamath. Six women made during the course of study, savings were estimated to be \$39.97 per suit, and women estimated an average of \$38.18 on each coat. The average cost of the workshop was \$10.23, the average cost of the suit was only \$13.07. The estimated value of garments made at about \$55.85 for the coats, and \$35.85 for the suits.
