## KMA Discusses Solicitation

The Klamath Merchants association met this week to discuss its standing policy on public solicitations in this city.

Whether the policy already drawn up should be continued regarding solicitations, should be relaxed or tightened, was thoroughly gone into with the result that the group decided to stand pat on present regulations.

One of the two main services of the chamber of commerce is to protect the community from unsound practices, the other to promote interests benefitting the greatest number of residents, Charles R. Stark manager pointed out.

Investigation of five requests for permission to solicit in Klamath Falls within a week showed some definitely "sour" and some questionable, resulting in a warning from the chamber against racketeering salesmen.

Checking with the Chicago Better Business Bureau it was discovered that the crew manager of one group of solicitors had served time for obtaining funds under false pretenses and was definitely unauthorized to solicit. This person had showed signed approval to go ahead from chambers of commerce and even from police departments of other cities.
