

Zell Elected Commander Of VFW Post In Klamath

E. V. Zell, World War I veteran, was elected commander of Pelican Post 1383 VFW at the annual election held Thursday night which was attended by nearly 100 veterans.

Frank Subject is the outgoing commander. Zell has been a resident of Klamath Falls for 10 years and a member of the local post for three. He has served in all offices including that of chaplain, working up to the rank of commander.

R. O. Miller was re-elected quartermaster and Martin Jenkins re-elected chaplain. Other officers elected were Walter Thoma and George Easter, World War II veterans, as senior and junior vice commanders; C. A. Catalano, post advocate and Dr. Cronin post surgeon, both World War II.

Everett Hickman World War I, elected as trustee for three years. Ralph Jones and Howard Burkhardt, veterans of World War II and Bob Canoy of World War I were elected to serve on the building commission.

New officers will be installed at ceremonies set for April 18, in the KC hall and all with the exception of trustee will serve one year.

Williams Now In Santa Fe

TULELAKE, March 23—Ivan Williams, department of justice representative in charge of the border patrol at the WRA center until two weeks ago, is now in Santa Fe, N. M., where he is directing dismantling of an internment camp. He was succeeded here by John P. Swanson who left on the special evacuee train Wednesday night with all border patrolmen who were scheduled for detail in southern states or on the west coast.

Hooch Held Wreck Cause

PORTLAND, March 23 (AP)—National surveys show liquor is a contributing factor in 20 per cent or more of all auto accidents. Ben F. Heinz, traffic safety commission director, told the Oregon Institute on Alcohol Studies.

Addressing the one-day session yesterday, Heinz declared hit-run drivers “almost invariably are intoxicated.” He recommended seizure of drunken drivers' cars, blood analysis tests of the drivers, and continued education.

Other speakers outlined legal and public health aspects, problems of alcoholics, cures, and youth instruction.

SALEM, March 23 (AP)—Some snow remained on mountain highway passes Saturday as the state highway commission reported road conditions over the state as generally improved.

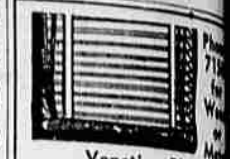
Road conditions:

Santiam Junction—2 inches new snow. Total snow at summit, 150 inches. Light packed snow in spots on roadway.
Odell Lake—2 inches new snow. 152 inches at the summit. Spots of packed snow between mile post 61 and 64.
Oregon 47—One way traffic, short section, 3.2 miles from Clatskanie due to wash-out.

Group Formed 21 Years Ago

Twenty-one years ago the first local Camp Fire Girls group met with Mrs. B. C. Thomas at her home, 447 Alameda, to begin an organization which has progressed until it has become one of the largest and most active groups of its kind in this area.

“It was in the spring of 1915,” recalled Mrs. Thomas, “when I first spoke to the girls of the seventh and eighth grades of the old Central school on the subject of organizing a group of Camp Fire Girls in Klamath Falls. In the fall of that year I was called out of the city for several months and turned the youthful group over to Mrs. Walter Montelius, the mother of one of the charter members of the group.”

Charter Members

The list of charter members included 18 names. Among the girls who first became interested were Edith Montelius, Freida Biehn Lucas, Constance Fisher, Iris Turner, Florence Bradley, Margaret Upp Mudd, Katherine Upp Kollias, Constance Miller Noble, Dorothy Sanderson Templar, Myler Calkins Stevenson, Esther Haines Dunivan and Eleanor Torrey Yeomans.

Since that time the group of Camp Fire Girls has expanded throughout Klamath Falls and the outlying communities. There are active groups in Chiloquin, Dorris and in the localities of the southern Klamath valley.

Origin In Maine

The organization was originated 36 years ago in Maine by Dr. Luther Halsey Gulick and other leaders in the educational field at that time. In 1912, the Camp Fire Girls' group was chartered. The first public service project was the collection of clothing for the children of Belgium during World War I.

This year the project is the promotion of international understanding among the members of the organization through study and communication with the girls in European countries. The Camp Fire Girls are again collecting clothing for the children of stricken countries as a part of this year's project, “At Home in the World.”
