

Kaiser Will Take Over N'West Aluminum Works

SPOKANE, March 25 (AP)—The "Inland Empire" fogged up today in its most sparkling snow-and-ice evergreens to celebrate the wedding of Henry J. Kaiser's industrial management and the government-owned aluminum works.

There was just enough secrecy about wedding plans to heighten the air of expectancy. Nobody knew whether the marriage license had been signed, or just when the wedding would take place, but the "best man" assured everyone it would be "within a few days."

The "best man," President E. H. Braden of the Spokane chamber of commerce, confided he had been asked to "shield" the Kaiser party "from the press."

Employment
When the triumphal wedding march peals out, it will be the signal for starting employment at the nearly \$93,000,000 plant, called the world's greatest. The aluminum reduction plant, where alumina is melted down in "pot lines" to produce aluminum ingots, can produce 216,000,000 pounds, or 4,320,000 fifty-pound ingots a year. The rolling mill can turn out 288,000,000 pounds of aluminum sheets a year—more than the whole world used before the war.

Braden told newsmen on a National Association of Manufacturers industrial tour of the state that demand for aluminum sheet "is simply skyrocketing." Orders, he said, were in sight to keep the industry working full blast for months to come. The plant can turn out aluminum foil, for which Braden forecast a great demand.

"We hope and expect that ex-

trusions and forgings will be added to the equipment at the rolling mill after Mr. Kaiser and his associates get into production," Braden commented. Kaiser is expected to hire around 2000 workmen. Aside from a few key men, he is expected to pick most of them from this locality.

Soviet Agent Said Nabbed

NEW YORK, March 25 (AP)—The Rt. Rev. Monsignor Fulton J. Sheen declared yesterday that a "full-fledged Soviet agent was picked up" in a congressional committee meeting last week.

In Washington the FBI said "we would not confirm it or deny it." Reachable members of the house of representatives said there had been little that would interest a foreign agent before committees in their branch last week.

Wall Doxey, the senate's sergeant at arms, said that if anything of the kind had occurred he did not know of it. Ordinarily, Doxey would be advised of an arrest on the senate side of the Capitol.

Speaking to members of the Catholic institute of the press Msgr. Sheen declined to name the "Soviet agent," but said he was not an elected official. He added he believed the person was from Chicago.

His statement was made in a speech in which he urged the state department to "lay more facts before the public about how our country is being endangered." He said there must be "more reporting" of the "undermining of government by alien and foreign interests."
