

Teachers' Convention Will Start

The curtain rises this week on the first Oregon teachers' convention in four years and the major education meeting in the Pacific northwest this year when members of the Oregon State Teachers' association assemble in Portland on Thursday and Friday, March 28 and 29.

Approximately 2500 teachers from all parts of the state are expected to attend the big meeting.

The 25-page convention program is crammed with activities for the teachers during their two-day stay in Portland. In addition to the lists of serious meetings, the program outlines a variety of entertainment features which include a general convention dance and 16 breakfasts, luncheons and dinners.

19 on Program

Nineteen prominent out-of-state educators and lecturers will appear on the convention program. A featured speaker will be F. L. Schlagle, president of the National Education association. From his experiences in a special U. S. delegate to the recent London conferences of

the United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural organization, Schlagle is expected to develop a world education picture in his appearance.

General session meetings of the convention will be held Thursday and Friday in the Portland Civic auditorium. In addition, the 29 departments of the association will hold specialized meetings in the Portland Art Museum and the Portland Central library.

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4 Vessels To Dock At West Coast

Nine vessels, carrying 5145 service personnel, are scheduled to arrive today at two east coast ports, while 1833 more troops are due to embark from four ships at two west coast ports.

In addition, one transport with 1218 British war brides and children, is expected at New York.

East coast arrivals: New York, six vessels, 5128; Norfolk, Va., three ships, 19.

The Fayetteville Victory, due at New York with 917 troops, was in collision early today with the S. S. Marion Crawford, but suffered no apparent damage.

Arriving at Seattle, Wash., is one ship, with two men, while three vessels with 1831 persons are scheduled at San Francisco.

Judge Offers Plan To Slow Divorces

PORTLAND, March 27 (AP)—A family counseling agency to cope with the rising divorce and juvenile delinquency rate in Portland was urged by Judge Donald Long of the court of domestic relations in an address at the YMCA annual meeting last night.

"It is hard to believe, but I have handled 2000 divorce cases through my court in the five months I have been here," he declared in reporting the number per month had doubled in the time since he entered military service.

"We could deny these divorces but we can't make people live together," he asserted in advocating a family counseling agency.
